

## Teachers' Notes - Additional Information for Teachers

1. **Statue** St Richard was Bishop of Chichester from 1245 until his death in 1253. He was considered to be a very holy man and was declared a saint in 1262. During the Middle Ages many pilgrims visited the Cathedral to pray at his shrine.

**Bell Tower** The top section (without glass) is where the bells are hung.

2. **Garoyles** drain the water from the roof and away from the stonework. Medieval stonemasons liked to use their imaginations here.
3. **Three Men's Morris** This game is in the 3<sup>rd</sup> bay (in the Western Arm of the Cloisters) from St. Richard's Door. It is a game rather like noughts and crosses. It originated in Ancient Egypt and was popular until the later Middle Ages. The Boy Choristers may have played this game as well as visiting pilgrims.
4. **The Dean** is the senior member of the clergy responsible for the Cathedral. The Dean is helped by a governing body, a mixture of clergy and lay people, called **Chapter**.
5. At Chichester Cathedral the adult singers in the Choir are called lay vicars - they are employed by the Dean and Chapter.
