Sermon for Mattins Sunday 30th September 2018

May I speak in the name of God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit

The cohort of new students arrived
At Chichester University
Last weekend
Depending where you live
You may have seen them
Or at least
Heard them

Meeting lots of new students reminds me of being a new student Of leaving home Going to stay in halls And being homesick I am one of those people Who always get homesick

being surrounded by people
Facing this kind of transition
for the first time
has made me reflect
On what makes us feel at home

And it is often little things Familiar people Familiar places Our own seat at the table

the familiar makes us feel safe

I suspect it was the same For the Jewish leaders The Pharisees and Lawyers Whose behaviour Is quite similar to ours The Pharisees and lawyers In today's reading Are religious leaders In a land that is occupied By oppressive conquerors

If Jesus accusations against them are accurate these religious leaders are finding their security not in the God they worship and serve but in the minutiae of the Law

they have shifted their focus from what they know of God through their scriptures which describe their salvation history and their Lord's call for justice and mercy

they have forgotten
the message of the Exodus
God's direct intervention
in human history
forgotten the return of the exiles
and the God working
through human agency in King Cyrus

they have forgotten God's promises to them and God's expectations of them

in response
Jesus accuses them of being
Leaders who are preoccupied
with status and glory
taking the best seats in the synagogue
and demanding the respect of the people

yet forgetting that leadership involves service

Jesus is angry with these leaders And Insults the Pharisee In front of his guests

Why is Jesus so angry?

Jesus frustration
Comes from the circumstances
which led to his invitation to dine

the reading we heard started

While Jesus was speaking, a Pharisee invited him to dine with him.

The Pharisee heard Jesus speaking, to a large crowd although he may not have noticed what Jesus was saying

Jesus had just compared the crowd of people Who have gradually gathered Around him

Compared them with the people of Nineveh who were pagans and outsiders and had no part in the Lord's promises

But Pagans and outsiders
Who heard the proclamation of Jonah
And repented
and turned from their evil ways

But the crowd Jesus has left Did not hear and repent Rather They accused Jesus Of being possessed by a demon

Jesus is angry and frustrated
With those who should be
The shepherds and guides of God's people.
The lawyers and the Pharisees.

Leaders who have forgotten
Their history and responsibilities
And found their security
In troubling times
In the keeping of the minutiae of the law

And as a result

Have become a barrier to others faith

To others salvation

Jesus said:

Woe to you lawyers!

For you have taken away the key of knowledge;
you did not enter yourselves,
and you hindered those who were entering.'

In the context of Jesus words
The key to salvation for the Jewish people
Was the knowledge
And right practice of the law

For us
Christian disciples
The key to salvation
To the Kingdom of heaven
is Jesus
who has redeemed us

I said earlier That our behaviour Is quite similar to the scribes and Pharisees

What I mean is that within the Church There can be a focus on status And minutiae of church life

Forgetting that Jesus came
To give us life in abundance
Which always means
Life opening up
Not shutting down

The students who arrived in Chichester last weekend Will settle here

And we hope will use their studies
And experiences
To develop a sense of infinite possibility
Of the world opening up
Of horizons widening

I believe this is true for all of us

When we encounter God Our dependence on the familiar Drops away

Because our security Comes from the love of God and the embrace of our Saviour, Jesus Christ
