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DEAN'S FOREWORD

This annual report gives an overview of Chichester Cathedral in the year 2017/18. The report, formal as it necessarily is, gives a flavour of the complex and varied nature of our life and work.

We continue to work hard at being the Cathedral, the seat of the Bishop and a centre of worship and mission. The Cathedral's strategic plan ambitiously sets out how we will do that over the next five years. It is the result of much conversation inside and outside the Cathedral, and will guide us in our worship, mission and common life in the years to come.

The Chapter said farewell to two of its members, Sara Stonor and Lesley Webster. They have both been dedicated and committed Lay Members, and we are indebted to them for their many years of service and many hours of discussions and travelling to and from Chichester. We are privileged to have had them as part of the Cathedral's life.

The huge task of renewing the Cathedral's roof covering and replacing it in lead has begun, and the Restoration and Development Trust has worked hard to find the finance needed to begin the project.

Our financial position continues to improve, though there is no room for complacency.

None of this would have been possible without the support and hard work of our staff, volunteers, worshippers and supporters. Their contribution to the ministry of the cathedral is immeasurable, and we are very grateful to them.

Later in the year we will publish our Annual Review which will describe in a less formal way something more of our activities during the year. In the meantime, I commend our Annual Report to you.

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STRATEGIC PLANS

During 2017/18 Chichester Cathedral Chapter undertook a strategic planning exercise to set the Cathedral's direction for the coming years, following the Bishop of Chichester's Visitation and Charge of 2016. The early drafts were shared and discussed with the Cathedral's senior lay staff, Cathedral Council, College of Canons and a wide range of stakeholders, who were generous with their time and feedback. The resultant strategic plan sets out the Cathedral's Vision, Purpose and Strategic Goals for 2018-23, and the values that will underpin them. CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL'S VISION AND PURPOSE

Through imaginative worship, inspiring music and art, engaging teaching and generous hospitality, we will be a place of transformation where our human experience finds its meaning in the unconditional love and compassion of God.

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THE CATHEDRAL'S FUTURE PLANS

The strategic goals provide the framework within which tactical planning and delivery will take place on a rolling basis. They now shape the executive team's annual business planning and budgeting process, which was originally introduced in 2016. The resulting Business Programme is a great way to share plans for each year with the Cathedral's many supporters and well-wishers – it can be viewed online. Chapter and the Executive Board will monitor progress against the objectives during the year and report on delivery at the end.

The Cathedral aims to develop its ability to act as a resource for the Chichester Diocese, of which it is the mother church. It will develop its music outreach, working with West Sussex Music, and in 2018/19 has plans to create a Young Organists' Day. Plans to improve facilities and to offer an exemplary welcome to visitors and worshippers will be supported by the opening of Paradise – the grassed area inside the Cloisters – to the public, the publishing of a new spiritual tour of the Cathedral and the introduction of external customer-focussed training for volunteers. The roof replacement work will continue, safeguarding the Cathedral for the future, and the Surveyor of the Fabric will complete a Quinquennial Inspection to ensure that any new threats to the building can be addressed. The Cathedral will continue to work alongside other Chichester Vision partners aiming to deliver an inspiring and welcoming city, full of opportunities for the future, and in particular will plan towards the possible re-landscaping of the area around West Street and the Cathedral in the long term.

Plans for the development of worship include a number of new liturgies, and the development of plans for a new nave division of the organ. Work with the Diocese to support the 'Year for Prayer 2018' will see four Archdeaconry Pilgrimages to the Cathedral and new liturgy for parish pilgrimages too.

Chapter's increased investment in Engagement and Learning will continue, with expanded opportunities for learning for families and young people including a pilot project with the National Citizens Service. The Cathedral's communications will be enhanced with the launch of a new website.

Commitment to Social Responsibility will continue, with a relaunched environmental policy to build on the recently secured Eco Church Bronze accreditation. Partnerships with complementary charities will extend the Cathedral's impact and the 'Ageing Well' programme will aim to develop the Cathedral as a Dementia Friendly space. The Cathedral will also undertake the Simple Quality Protects (SQP) Safeguarding Audit to help it become a safer environment for all.

Financial sustainability will continue to be a focus, continuing the recent progress towards a balanced operational budget and enhancing the Cathedral's Fundraising capacity through close working relationships with the Chichester Cathedral Restoration and Development Trust and Chichester Cathedral Friends. Property initiatives in the Close are also planned to generate increased income. Restructuring in Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd – our trading company – is also planned, targeting greater financial support for the Cathedral's mission, as well as an improved experience for new and regular visitors.

Good Governance will continue to be a priority, using guidance from the Charity Commission, Association of English Cathedrals and the Cathedrals Working Group's report. New Chapter members will be recruited and the governance of St Mary's Hospital almshouses will be revised, ensuring that they are independent of Chapter but maintaining historic and operational links, and preserving their distinct Christian ethos.

STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT (GOVERNANCE)

CONSTITUTION AND STATUTES

The Cathedral is governed by the Cathedrals Measure 1999 and its resulting Constitution and Statutes that came into effect in September 2000. The Constitution and Statutes require that any person or body having functions under these instruments shall have due regard to the fact that the Cathedral is the seat of the Bishop of Chichester and a centre of worship and mission.

The authorities in this section each have a specific role in the governance of the Cathedral.

THE CHAPTER OF THE CATHEDRAL

Under the Constitution of the Cathedral, Chapter shall consist of the Dean (Chairman) and all Residentiary Canons of the Cathedral; one member of the College of Canons elected by the College; between two and six other persons appointed jointly by the Bishop and Chapter; and the Communar.

Following the December 2017 meeting of Chapter, two members – Mrs Sara Stonor and Mrs Lesley Webster – retired. After much consideration about the skillsets required in new Chapter members to best serve the Cathedral, a lengthy recruitment process was embarked upon with the assistance of a specialist trustee recruitment company with new appointments to be made during the new financial year.

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of the Chapter to direct and oversee the administration of the affairs of the Cathedral having regard to the views of the Bishop, the College of Canons and the Cathedral Council and in particular to:

- Order the worship and promote the mission of the Cathedral.
- Formulate, after consultation with the Bishop, proposals in connection with the general direction and mission of the Cathedral and submit them to the Council for its advice.
- Prepare an annual budget for the Cathedral.
- Submit to the Council the annual report and audited accounts prepared by the Chapter and such other reports as may be requested by the Council on any matter concerning the Cathedral.
- Submit to the College of Canons the annual report and audited accounts prepared as aforesaid.
- Keep under review the Constitution and Statutes of the Cathedral.
- Manage all property vested in the Cathedral and the income accruing from it and, in particular, ensure
 that the necessary repairs and maintenance in respect of the Cathedral and its contents and other
 buildings and monuments are carried out.
- Perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

The Chapter is also responsible under the requirements laid down by the Church Commissioners under the powers given them by Section 27 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999 for:

- Preparing and publishing an annual report and audited accounts which give a true and fair view of the
 financial activities for each financial year and of the assets, liabilities and funds at the end of each financial
 year of Chichester Cathedral and its connected entities.
- Stating that they have complied in all material respects with the guidelines on the subject prepared by the Association of English Cathedrals or describing which recommendations have not been complied with and giving reasons for non-compliance.

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- Selecting suitable accounting policies and then applying them consistently.
- Making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- Keeping proper accounting records from which the financial position of the Cathedral can be ascertained with reasonable accuracy at any time.
- Safeguarding the assets of the Cathedral and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Cathedral is a Public Benefit entity and in setting the aims of the Cathedral Chapter has had due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on Public Benefit.

New members of Chapter undergo a thorough induction to brief them on their obligations, including briefings from the Cathedral's specialist staff and specific information about the Cathedral Constitution and Statutes and the Cathedrals Measure 1999. The Cathedral's structure, decision-making processes and the financial performance of the Cathedral are also addressed. Members of Chapter are encouraged to attend appropriate training events, especially those provided throughout the year by the Association of English Cathedrals.

The pay of senior staff is reviewed annually and increases are considered by Chapter in the context of average wage inflation in the charitable sector and the wider economy. When reviewing senior roles Chapter benchmarks pay levels against similar roles in other Cathedrals of a similar size, in other comparable charitable organisations and in the wider region. Clergy stipend levels are set nationally by the Church Commissioners.

THE CATHEDRAL COUNCIL

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of the Council to further and support the work of the Cathedral, spiritual, pastoral, evangelistic and ecumenical, reviewing and advising upon the direction and oversight of that work by the Chapter.

The Bishop, as Visitor, is invited to attend as an advisor and non-voting member.

The Council is therefore both an advisory and consultative body and it has been meeting twice a year since its inauguration in January 2001. During the period of this report the Council has met to be briefed and to discuss a range of topics which have included:

- Reviewing the Chapter's annual report and commenting on the wide range of Cathedral activities contained therein.
- Considering the Accounts for 2016/2017 and the Budget for 2018/2019.
- Receiving briefs from the chairmen of the various Cathedral committees.
- Input into the Cathedral's Strategic Plan.
- Reflecting on "Bishop George Bell The Independent Review" by Lord Carlile.
- Considering the Cathedrals Working Group draft report.

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THE COLLEGE OF CANONS

The College of Canons is formed from the Dean, Residentiary Canons, Lay Members of Chapter, the Bishops Suffragan, the Archdeacons, thirty-one Prebendary Canons and up to five Lay Canons (none of whom have been appointed to date). Two members are elected to the Cathedral Council. One member is elected to Chapter. The Communar acts as Secretary.

The College of Canons shall:

- Meet annually on a day as near as convenient to the Feast of All Saints, whenever the Bishop desires to seek its counsel or advice on any matter, whenever it is required to make an election or, if a request for a meeting were made by not less than two-thirds of its members.
- Receive and consider the annual report and audited accounts.
- Discuss such matters concerning the Cathedral as may be raised by any of its members.
- Perform such functions as may be prescribed.

THE BISHOP

The Cathedral is the Mother Church of the Diocese and values its central role in the Diocese's worshipping life and its close relationship with the Bishop of Chichester and his team. The principal seat of the Bishop is in the Cathedral and the Bishop presides regularly at services including ordinations. In the last year we have especially enjoyed the number of services which have seen the licensing and welcoming of significant Diocesan appointments in the Cathedral.

During the year Chapter continued working in response to the Bishops Visitation of November 2016. The Bishop joined Chapter in November to receive a report of progress against his directions and recommendations.

FABRIC ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Under the Care of Cathedrals Measure 1990 (as amended in 2008 and 2011), the Fabric Advisory Committee (FAC) is responsible to the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England (CFCE) and considers applications from the Chapter in regard to proposed development of and changes to the Cathedral's fabric. It also advises Chapter on the care, conservation, repair and development of the Cathedral and meets three times a year.

The ten members of this committee serve for a period of five years and may be re-appointed. The members appoint a Chairman from among their own number. The Communar is the FAC Secretary. The Dean, Surveyor of the Fabric, Consultant Archaeologist and Clerk of Works attend meetings of the Committee and are entitled to speak but not to vote. Other Chapter members are free to attend if they wish.

During this reporting period, there were no changes to the Committee's membership with one vacancy waiting to be filled as at the end of March 2018.

Over the course of the year the committee considered and were kept informed about the development and progress of the following projects:

- Conservation of the two Romanesque reliefs
- Restoration of the Western arm of the cloisters including a new, permanent gate into Paradise
- Replacement of the Cathedral's high copper roofs with historically accurate lead
- New database for the management of the Cathedral Inventory

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- Temporary loan of the Graham Sutherland painting 'Noli Me Tangere' to Coventry Cathedral
- A five yearly inspection of the Lambert Barnard paintings
- New handrail for the spiral staircase in the Bell Tower
- New ramp from the South aisle into the South Transept
- New Cathedral nave seating frontals
- Chichester Vision consultations with specific interest in the future of the Western approach to the Cathedral
- Conversion and refurbishment of 1 St Richard's Walk
- Re-roofing of Vicars' Hall
- Installation of a new safety wire system at clerestory level
- "Stations of the Incarnation" a pilgrimage trail around the Cathedral to tell the story of the life of Christ through artistic installations

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee meets four times a year.

The Committee consists of a Chairman and up to four other members appointed by Chapter for their expertise and experience in the field of finance and investment management. Chapter members are the Dean, Precentor and Communar with the Chapter Accountant as another member.

CATHEDRAL COMMUNITY ROLL

Membership of the Cathedral Roll is open to anyone aged sixteen or over who worships regularly at the Cathedral, is resident in the Close or holds office linked to the Cathedral. There is an annual meeting of those on the Cathedral Roll, chaired by the Dean, at which elections take place to the Cathedral Council, the Cathedral Community Committee and the Chichester Deanery Synod.

During this year 21 new members joined the Roll and 13 were removed. The number of persons on the Cathedral Roll on 31 March 2018 was 528.

CATHEDRAL COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

The Cathedral Community Committee meets at least four times a year to advise the Chapter on all matters affecting the Cathedral Community and to undertake such functions as may be delegated to it by Chapter.

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THE CATHEDRAL'S ACTIVITIES DURING THE YEAR

BUSINESS PLAN

Of the 88 objectives in its agreed Business Plan for the year, Chapter was pleased to see 58 delivered in full and 24 in part with just 6 unachieved. The executive team achieved a great deal during the year, in areas as diverse as the hosting of the Walsingham Festival and the securing of Eco Church Accreditation. The 'Live Together Better' event for International Peace Day was a great success, and the Cathedral also played host to the Cathedral Organists' Association Conference. The 1910 Somers Clerk Reredos returned to the Cathedral floor as the centerpiece of the re-dedicated Sailors' Chapel in July.

A range of successful building projects included the restoration of the West Cloister and the commencement of an ambitious multi-year project to replace the Cathedral's failing copper roofs with longer-lasting and more historically authentic lead. An increased focus on the Cathedral's property saw the creation of a new Property Committee, which hit the ground running in the Autumn supported by the Cathedral's new Head of Estates, Andy Wright. Financial management, supported by improved finance processes, continued to be important and Chapter remains committed to setting and achieving its ambitions within a framework of good financial discipline.

WORSHIP

During the year the Cathedral hosted four weddings, two baptisms, three funerals and twelve memorial services. The Cathedral has also welcomed 41 visiting choirs over the year to sing services for which the Cathedral Choir is unavailable.

The financial year was bookended by Holy Week and Easter celebrations, with guest preachers Charlie Allen (Director of Ordinands for Salisbury Diocese) and Bishop Laurie Green. Eleven Christmas carol services were held for outside organisations including St Wilfrid's Hospice and the West Sussex Federation of Womens' Institutes. There was a high attendance at the Cathedral's own Christmas services, and for the first time the annual crib service was held twice on Christmas Eve, allowing an even greater number of young people to engage with the Christmas story. Another new initiative was a dementia-friendly carol service, which was hosted in partnership with the Chichester Anna Chaplaincy.

Other special services included a service marking the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the modern Hospice movement, while the farming and shepherding community of West Sussex was celebrated in a Shepherd Service. Annual services were once again held for Chichester District Scouts and Girl Guides, the Royal Sussex Regimental Association and Stonepillow (as part of their Sleepout event), and graduation ceremonies were held for Chichester College, the National Citizen Service and the West Sussex County Council apprenticeship scheme.

In addition to the Cathedral's daily office, Day Chaplains provide pastoral support to visitors to the Cathedral, and invite visitors to join them in a short moment of prayer on the hour. The Pebbles children's group which meets during the Sunday Eucharist continues to thrive, and a special processional cross for the group has been blessed and is in regular use.

In July 2017 the Cathedral's long-serving Liturgy and Music Administrator, Paul Legrave, left to take up a post at the West Sussex Lieutenancy. He was succeeded by Richard Paterson, who also continues in his role as Lay Vicar in the Cathedral Choir.

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MUSIC AND CONCERTS

The choir had a particularly full and exciting year, with a busy programme of extra events supplementing its core mission at the heart of the Cathedral's pattern of worship. Just a week after the Easter celebrations, the choir took up an invitation to sing in The Netherlands. The tour began with a concert in Haarlem's recently restored Catholic Cathedral, where they also sang at Mass the following morning. From there they travelled to the university town of Leiden to sing Evensong at the Hooglandse Kerk, a service that attracted a congregation of 500.

Soon after their return, the choir travelled to London to participate in the Festival of the Sons and Friends of the Clergy, joining the choirs of St Paul's and Chester Cathedral. The same week, Chichester hosted the annual conference of the Cathedral Organists Association, attended by 50 delegates who enjoyed both the music and hospitality. Visits to St Mary's Kemptown and the Church of the Ascension at Peacehaven served as fruitful outreach, and a run of Christmas concerts at the Festival Theatre saw the choir singing to a combined audience of several thousand. A large radio audience tuned in for a carol service broadcast live on BBC Surrey and Sussex.

The two RSCM choir festivals brought many hundreds of parish church musicians to Chichester from around the diocese, giving affirmation of their work in joyful acts of worship. Towards the end of the summer term, the choir sang at a fundraising reception at Bignor House, an event that generated valuable new interest and support. Three new Lay Vicars joined the choir in September, and the following month saw the triumph of Rafi Bellamy Plaice, former Head Chorister, at the BBC Choristers of the Year competition.

These special events, in which the choir served as fine ambassadors for the Cathedral, took place in the context of the regular schedule of eight Choral services each week during term time, a routine that remains the choir's most important commitment.

The Cathedral continues to be a popular concert venue, and in the past year has hosted performances by The Sixteen, Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra, Chichester Singers, and Southdowns Concert Band, as well as folk acts Show of Hands and Richard Durrant. Christmas concerts were also presented from G4 and Hanover Band, and in January the Cathedral marked Holocaust Memorial Day with a community performance of the opera *Push*, with University musicians accompanying a chorus composed of local schoolchildren.

The Cathedral's series of free lunchtime concerts continues to attract an average audience of 500 per week, contributing over £10,000 to Cathedral funds.

THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE CATHEDRAL AND THE DIOCESE

As Mother Church to the Diocese of Chichester, the Cathedral shares in the Diocese's mission and ministry through support of diocesan events and outreach to parish groups, who are encouraged to visit the Cathedral to experience and share in worship, and are invited annually for tea and Evensong through the Parish Links programme.

The Cathedral has hosted a number of diocesan services, including the ordination of deacons and licensing of lay readers, the annual Chrism Eucharist, a service of Confirmation for the Arundel and Bognor deanery, and the licensing of Ann Waizeneker as Dean of Women's Ministry. The Cathedral also held a beacon event for the Archbishops' Thy Kingdom Come prayer initiative at Pentecost, welcoming people from across the diocese.

Four honorary Canons were installed during services of Choral Evensong, and also two Canons of Honour, recognising the Diocese's strong ecumenical relationships. These relationships were reinforced at a special service marking the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. The Cathedral also welcomed a thousand-strong congregation of pilgrims for the Walsingham Festival in October.

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The Cathedral continues to work with the Diocesan Education Department, and four school leavers' services were held in the summer. The Cathedral's strong link with the Prebendal School continues, and Cathedral Deacon Irene Smale was licensed as Chaplain to the school.

FINANCIALLY SUPPORTING THE DIOCESE

Chapter's policy is to give priority to requests from the Diocese for the use of the Cathedral or other facilities within the Precinct. By not charging facility fees for diocesan events, the Cathedral made an effective donation of £6,795 over the course of the year.

OTHER EVENTS

The Cathedral frequently plays host to events and gatherings which are part of the life of the community we serve. The Cathedral's Bell Ringers held an Open Day in April offering an opportunity to experience bell ringing. Highlights of this year's many charitable and community events included Stonepillow's annual Sleepout and the Royal British Legion's Poppy Appeal. The Cathedral Green provided a public viewpoint for the fireworks to mark the City's Christmas Lights Switch On event at the end of November - perhaps the last such event for a while, as the firework-unfriendly temporary roof was installed soon after.

LEARNING AND ENGAGEMENT

The Learning and Engagement Department welcomed over 9,600 people to organised events and activities at the Cathedral during this period, providing opportunities for people of all ages to engage with the Cathedral and its significance in ways appropriate to them. Developing opportunities for learning through interfaith activity has been a significant new area of work during this year and one we look forward to developing further, as we continue to grow our relationships with local faith communities. This has included an interfaith panel discussion as part of the programme of activity marking International Day of Peace and a series of interfaith seminars delivered through our GCSE Religious Studies day for secondary schools.

The Cathedral is delighted to have secured external funding to support the recruitment of a new part-time post for three years, Families and Young People's Officer. This role will lead, develop and deliver Chichester Cathedral's community learning programme for families and young people, delivering innovative engagement activity informed by need and based on partnership working. A successful pilot event, engaging forty local young people with the Cathedral through the arts, took place in partnership with the Chichester Community Development Trust and Ovation Music.

The schools and colleges programme continues to flourish with a particular focus this year on promoting and delivering a new series of interactive guided tours exploring the Cathedral as a Place of Worship for primary schools, which has been very well received. Volunteer support and training is key to this success and our fantastic team of 56 volunteers has demonstrated commitment and enthusiasm for the changes in approach to delivery. Our partnership with West Sussex Music continues to grow with the 2018 Young Voices Festival engaging 530 primary school children in learning about and performing choral music. In recognition of the ever increasing pressure on teachers, the popular Teacher Twilight training delivered by the Cathedral School Friends Scheme has developed a focus on teacher wellbeing this year.

The Cathedral has welcomed hundreds of families during five activity days and initial preparation has taken place in this period to increase access to these events for disadvantaged families, with support from Family Support Work.

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The Adult Learning and Engagement programme included several highlights this year attracting participants from across the Diocese and beyond. These included the Chancellor's lecture series 'The Bible in the Public Square'; the annual Biblical study day, on the theme of 'Troublesome Texts'; the launch of a Hot Topic series for 2018 exploring Peace and Reconciliation, and the Cathedral's first ever Dementia Friendly carol service.

LECTURES

In order to complement the diocesan 'Year of the Bible', the Chancellor shared his annual lectures (this year on 'The Bible in the Public Square') with three biblical scholars: Dr Hannah Strommen (University of Chichester), Professor James Crossley (St Mary's University, Twickenham) and Professor Richard Bauckham. The Bauckham lecture also formed part of the programme of Chichester Theological Society, which is a collaborative venture between the Cathedral and the University of Chichester. Other CTS lectures included Canon Dr Jim Walters on 'Redeeming Money: The Quest for an Economy of Generosity' and Professor Christopher Rowland on 'William Blake: Radical Prophet.'

The Cathedral's residential and conference facility continued to be well used, both for commercial and 'primary' use. The Cathedral's Learning and Engagement Department ran a series of events in 4 Canon Lane on the theme of Peace and Reconciliation. Highlights included a powerful talk by Kemal Parvenic, a survivor of the notorious Omarska concentration camp in Bosnia, and a workshop on reconciliation led by Dr Simon Keyes of Winchester University as part of World Peace Day.

VISITORS

Visitors Numbers

The total number of people entering the Cathedral over the period of this report was approximately 373, 000. The total number of "tourists" to the Cathedral was estimated to be approximately 265, 000.

Exhibitions

A number of exhibitions took place during the period of this report:

'400 Days' This extraordinary exhibition by the poet and artist Frieda Hughes gave visitors the unique opportunity to see 400 paintings created over '400 Days'. The paintings were displayed from June until August, and arose from Frieda deciding to find out if she could create a single painting every day for a year. This project was an exploration in what it looks like when one person describes their experiences in shape and colour over a finite period of time. Each painting measured 10 by 14 inches and the exhibition showcased all 400 paintings hung together in one optimum block measuring 4 by 9 metres long. This visual treat and the idea behind the paintings were very popular with the Cathedral's visitors.

'Alternative Values' This exhibition accompanied 400 Days and included poetry by Frieda Hughes. Many of the poems were a personal exploration of her childhood with her parents, the poets Ted Hughes and Sylvia Plath.

Enlightenment' A beautiful glass sculpture, created especially for Chichester Cathedral, was on display from November to February. Designed and created by the award-winning artist Amy Cushing, the sculpture was made up of five hundred pieces of handmade glass within a delicate three metre floating column. It was suspended above the font in the Cathedral's Baptistry.

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Visitor Research Project

This year saw the culmination of an extensive research project to better understand our visitors and their levels of enjoyment and engagement. The findings were substantial and they will underpin our strategy for years to come. A small selection of the learning included: 62% of Cathedral visitors consider themselves Christian but only 10% identify as worshippers; a high proportion of visitors come from high income brackets but just 20% from 'lower social grades'; and the Cathedral is often viewed as not particularly 'family friendly' with just 1% visiting for child-related reasons. We also learned that although 38% of people expect to pay they do not then go on to make a donation.

Donations Research

Following on from the Visitor Research Project, further research into donations also took place as part of a range of efforts to reduce the deficit budget. The research included other non-charging cathedrals and experimented with the location of donation boxes, key messaging and different payment options.

Trials also explored the welcome given to the Cathedral's visitors and a total of 78 hours were spent greeting just under 5000 visitors using three different welcoming methods. These methods ranged from more casual greetings to a more structured script with a specific donation request. The visitors' verbal responses and reactions were recorded alongside the levels of financial giving, so in this way the trials took care to understand the impact on the visitors' experience alongside any potential financial gain.

These trials did reveal how donations could be significantly increased, however, Chapter has chosen not to implement these changes at this stage as they would require a substantial shift in our ministry of welcome.

MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS

Website Project/ Social Media

The creation of a new cathedral website is being financially supported by the Chichester Cathedral Friends, and after a careful tender process Hampshire based design agency Oyster was appointed as the new provider. This important project will bring all the Cathedral's websites together, so work began with understanding the needs of all parts of the Cathedral. A new site architecture was agreed upon and many helpful new developments have been initiated as a result of the research into the Cathedral's visitors, and the feedback in the Bishop's Charge. The new site will have a new 'exploring Christianity' section and will also do more to promote the Cathedral's offering for families.

The design phase of this project was particularly rewarding as the new website will enable us to make much better use of photography and show the Cathedral's beauty to greater effect. The project is expected to be completed towards the end of 2018.

The Cathedral's social media profile is growing, covering five platforms: Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, YouTube, and SoundCloud. The Cathedral's Twitter feed now has over 4,000 followers, who regularly respond and retweet the Cathedral's daily posts. Similarly, the Cathedral's Facebook is building an online community and a number of BBC and ITV Cathedral news items are now hosted on our YouTube channel.

Publicity/TV/Radio

The Cathedral achieved regular press and media coverage throughout the year and enjoyed a wide of range of news items and stories. Filmed in May 2017, 'Elizabeth I's Secret Agents' was a three-part series filmed in the Lady Chapel, the South Transept and the West End of the Cloisters. This prestigious BBC2 documentary went on to be BAFTA-nominated. July saw the Frieda Hughes' '400 Days' exhibition and media interest from the Sunday Times, the Church Times, and a live broadcast by BBC South Today. Further BBC coverage in August included St Mary's Hospital and their role in Heritage Open Days. The silencing of Big Ben brought BBC Sussex Radio who interviewed Tower Master Hamish McNaughton about bell-ringing. Sussex Life filmed the Cathedral's hymn boards for their annual Awards Evening in September, and October saw previous Cathedral

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chorister Rafi Bellamy-Plaice named BBC Radio 2 Young Chorister of the Year. Media attention continued on into December with BBC South Today interviewing Rafi for their Christmas broadcast.

The new year brought PUSH a Holocaust Opera' with both BBC South Today and ITV Meridian News visiting the Cathedral and this was followed by the press launch of the campaign to restore the Cathedral's high roof which brought widespread coverage. Over one hundred regional newspapers across England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales, covered this story pushing this news all across the UK. National newspapers (for example the Telegraph, Daily Mail) also picked up on the story and more locally, all our key TV and radio contacts supported the campaign throughout the South.

Soon after this, BBC Sussex returned to interview the Dean about his inspiring 'Lent without Plastic' initiative and supporting blog.

LIBRARY

The Library has welcomed a large number of visiting groups and individuals during the year. Although access to the Library is by arrangement (given the value of many of the books) there are many opportunities for visitors willing to brave the spiral staircase to enjoy this this lesser known part of the Cathedral. Open days continued to be extremely popular, attracting hundreds of visitors. Research scholars also continue to come to the Library, and the Cathedral's Learning and Engagement team make regular use of the Library holdings for activities for children and adults.

Chris Smith, the volunteer Sub-Librarian, has done a fine job, responding to numerous enquiries made on a wide range of topics, co-ordinating the activities outlined above, and working with the Chancellor and Library Advisory Group (made up of external library professionals) on matters of strategy and policy. Some of the libraries storage facilities are nearing the end of their life, and ways forward have been identified with the help of Andy Wright, the Cathedral's Head of Estates.

CATHEDRAL TREASURY

The Treasury's role continues as a public display of communion plate and other pieces of historic interest, principally on loan from parishes of the Diocese. The collection has remained static during the year.

A number of not-too-distant parishes continue to withdraw pieces temporarily for use or display at major festivals, other special services or exhibitions. Also, parish visits to the Treasury continue. During the year we have resumed the practice, when inviting parishes to attend evensong on the day when their parish is remembered in prayer across the Diocese, of reminding lending parishes of their loan and suggesting a Treasury visit. Continuing parish interest in their loaned pieces, and in the collection as a whole, is something that the Treasury particularly welcomes and encourages.

During the year the Sub-Treasurer gave talks to a Treasury Study Day in Guildford Cathedral and a Reformation Study Evening in Rogate parish.

CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ENTERPRISES LIMITED

Chapter solely owns Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd (CCEL) which undertakes the commercial activities of the Cathedral Café, Cloisters Shop, Box Office, Vicars Hall, 4 Canon Lane and other venues located within

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the Cathedral precinct. Where profits are earned they are covenanted to Chapter and details of its trading activities are summarised within the statement of consolidated financial activities and the notes to the accounts.

Overall result

CCEL had an extremely tough trading year that has resulted in a loss of £55,994 for the year to March 31st 2018. The result reflects a level of fixed costs and ways of working that were established to address a level of ambition in the Café and event business that has unfortunately failed to materialise or to work profitably. The Board and Management of CCEL – led by General Manager Amy Sim, have undertaken a wholesale review of the strategic offering and will be reducing the scope of activity. The result for the year end March 2018 includes a restructuring provision. Staff consultations took place during May and June 2018 and the result has been some redundancies and changes to contracts aimed at reducing the level of fixed cost and a more agile business model that will better support the Cathedral in its mission. Sadly this means saying 'goodbye' to some members of the Enterprises team, notably long serving Head Chef, Barry Kearns, and Retail and Commercial Development Manager, Kay McCluskey. The redundancies reflect a need for change but not a lack of commitment on behalf of the Enterprises team who have responded very positively to the challenges. We are grateful to those who are leaving for all their efforts on the Cathedral's behalf and wish them well.

Chapter, as the sole shareholder in CCEL, remains committed to supporting the business as it returns to profitability.

Cloisters Café, 4 Canon Lane and Hospitality

The combined sales were £1,073,152, some £90,000 behind the revenue in 2016. Whilst 4 Canon Lane continues to enjoy strong bookings and occupancy rates, the Café and events business have been particularly disappointing. It is expected that the biennial Flower Festival in May 2018 will contribute to a better result in the coming year for the events business.

The contribution from 4 Canon Lane has not been enough to offset the degradation in the hospitality part of the business.

CCEL continued to support the Cathedral with events and hospitality around the Cathedral Close ranging from coffee mornings to large formal dinners, also hosting visitors from other Cathedrals in the café, Vicars' Hall and 4 Canon Lane. 2018/19 will see a new approach to the hospitality business, focussing on the types of events that can be delivered profitably, and partnering with external caterers where appropriate.

Cloisters Shop

The Cathedral's shop achieved sales of £138,484, which was some £18,000 less than budgeted and £19,000 less than last year. Despite a relatively healthy 54% margin, the shop effectively broke even for the year, an improvement on 2016/17. The shop offering, including the management of slow moving and redundant stock, is a strategic focus for the future.

The Directors of Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd (of whom three are Chapter members) are appointed by Chapter and are listed at Appendix 15. The Board and Chapter remain fully committed to support the business through this strategic change and the subsequent period of refocus.

SAFEGUARDING

Chapter is committed to the protection of children and adults at risk of harm who are visiting the cathedral, the cathedral choristers and those attending services, as well as any employees, trainees and volunteers.

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In accordance with the House of Bishops Policy documents the Cathedral has a written Safeguarding Policy and Guidelines – the policy is available in the Cathedral and on its website.

In 2017/18 Chapter took a significant step in its provision by entering into a Service Level Agreement with the Chichester Diocesan Safeguarding Team. This means that the Cathedral now has support from highly trained safeguarding professionals, who support the team on the ground with advice, best practice guidance and training. The Cathedral's Safeguarding Officer is now Morag Keane, the Deputy Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor, who reports regularly to Chapter. Morag is supported by a local team including the Communar and representatives from a number of departments, and an independent representative from the Cathedral Congregation, Mrs Ruth Taunt.

During the year the Safeguarding Policy was comprehensively re-written and a major programme of training begun, supported by the Church of England's excellent online resources.

THE CATHEDRAL AND ITS INTERIOR

This year saw the beginning of a huge project that will eventually see the leaking copper roof replaced with lead. Lead is the cathedral's original roof covering and its return has been heartily endorsed by Historic England and the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings (SPAB). Phase one of the project is the Presbytery and Choir roofs, and side aisles, costing approximately £1.8m. Eventually the work is expected to cost in the region of £5.8m, and its completion is heavily dependent on securing funding for the later stages.

Work to erect the scaffold began in November, ahead of the return of the peregrine falcons. With days to spare the task of enclosing the eastern end of the Cathedral with scaffold and temporary roof was completed and the scaffold encapsulated in recyclable shrink wrap. The next step was to strip the old copper, which will also be recycled. After this came the exposure of the historic timbers, a number of which are in urgent need of repair and replacement. The last known large-scale attention to these timbers would have been to address wall plate decay in the 1960s when large sections were removed and replaced with concrete. Happily very little of this concrete needs to be removed. Works continue to progress, including the introduction of improved ventilation and rainwater management from high and aisle roofs.

The year also saw a project to would address the severely decaying stonework tracery to the western arm windows. In July, specialist glaziers began the task of removing the leaded windows for restoration in conjunction with local stonemasons, replacing the intricate tracery stonework. The project, which was successfully completed in November, also included a new gate and adjacent tracery work.

During this time, works also progressed within the Cathedral which saw the restoration and reinstallation of the reredos to the Sailor's Chapel and recycling of removed raised flooring to create a new disabled ramp, significantly improving access to the South Transept.

CATHEDRAL CLOSE AND PROPERTY

2017 saw changes in the Estates team with the appointment of a new Head of Estates and restructuring of the maintenance team that will remain focused on looking after the Cathedral estate and ensuring the best use of our property portfolio. An example of this is the expansion of the project that looked at converting the large first floor flat at St Richards Walk to now include the second floor flat. Details were approved and consents granted to convert the flats in to four one-bedroom units that will be ready for occupation in 2018.

ANNUAL REPORT, AND AUDITED ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH 2018

The year also saw the start of a smaller cathedral roofing project that addressed the replacement of the failing clay peg tiles and decaying roof-lights to the ancient Grade I listed Vicars' Hall. Not without its challenges, the works also included upgrading thermal insulation, ventilation and external lead and brick repairs ready for summer 2018.

OUR PEOPLE

2017 -2018 was a year of much staff change with the arrival of 21 new employees across Chapter and Enterprises in addition to those employed on seasonal worker contracts in Enterprises. Julia Murray Logue, our first HR Manager, came to the end of her fixed term contract in December 2017 and has left for new adventures.

During the last year, we have introduced a performance development review process that provides opportunities for each employee to have regular discussions with their line manager about their performance and development.

Chichester Cathedral continues to be a National Living Wage [NLW] Employer which means that the minimum wage that we pay staff is the NLW rate. All staff received a pay increase effective from 1 April, which saw the salaries of those on NLW increase and all other staff received a 2% pay increase.

VOLUNTEERS

To create a forum where volunteering policy could be discussed, and issues raised and addressed, the Volunteers Committee was formed in February 2017. With members representing Chapter, Cathedral staff and volunteer team leaders, the Committee has met throughout the year with the overarching aim of playing a positive role in enabling a flourishing volunteer community to support the mission and ministry of the Cathedral.

In April, visitors were given a rare opportunity to see inside the Bell Tower, with the Cathedral's experienced team of ringers giving guided tours and demonstrations throughout the day. In July, the Chichester Anna Chaplaincy was launched. Anna Chaplaincy is a registered charity dedicated to the befriending and supporting of older people and their families and carers. The launch was to formalise the work already being done in this area and to introduce the newly appointed local Chaplain, Lou Lou Morris. In January 2018, Judith Lee, Head Guide, started a training course for twelve prospective new Cathedral Guides.

THE WIDER CATHEDRAL FAMILY

CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL RESTORATION AND DEVELOPMENT TRUST

The Trust was formed in 1980 and since then has raised money for the restoration and development of Chichester Cathedral, other buildings within its precincts, its music foundation and such other charitable objects and activities undertaken by the Chapter.

The past year saw the formal launch of the appeal to raise the estimated £5.8 million required to re-cover the Cathedral's roofs which is fortunate to have Dame Patricia Routledge as its Patron. A well attended press launch saw representatives from the press, TV and radio meet Dame Patricia and the appeal Chairman, Mr Daniel Hodson, and tour the historic roofs. A number of successful fundraising events were held during the year to further the appeal including a 'Fête Champêtre' at the beautiful Pashley Manor, Ticehurst and a stunning dinner hosted by the Dean in the Cathedral Nave, with special guest Emma Bridgewater, Patron to the 2018 Festival of Flowers. Significant income was also received from the First World War Centenary Cathedral Repairs Fund (a

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one off source of funding to English Cathedral's from the Department for Culture, Media & Sport), the Hans and Julia Rausing Trust (on behalf of Helen, Lady Broughton), the Headley Trust and the Wates Foundation.

The Trust's continuing fundraising efforts allowed for the provision of over £750,000 to Chapter enabling a number of significant projects during the year, including: the restoration of the Western arm of the Cloisters, the re-covering and restoration of the Quire roof, the re-tiling and repair of the Vicars' hall roof, the repair of the Cathedral Organ's blower, an inspection into the condition of the Lambert Barnard paintings, and contributions to the work of the Learning & Engagement and Liturgy & Music departments.

In the year to come the Trust has committed to provide the funds required by Chapter for the completion of the re-covering and restoration of the Quire roof and the work on the Vicars' Hall roof, and is well positioned to support the next phase of the Cathedral roof programme, anticipated to start in late 2018. The Trust will also work closely with Cathedral departments to continue to identify opportunities for raising necessary funds to support their important work.

Support is typically received from individual donors, legacies, charitable trusts, PCCs, companies and fundraising events. The most significant being the biennial three day Festival of Flowers, the next to be held in June 2018.

The Trustees are listed at Appendix 10.

CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL MILLENNIUM ENDOWMENT TRUST

The Millennium Endowment Trust was established in 1997 with the aim of raising an endowment fund of £5 million to be held in perpetuity; the income from which would provide funds for the Chichester Cathedral Restoration & Development Trust. The Trust is now generating annual income in excess of £150,000 and this is available to the Restoration and Development Trust. No funds were distributed in the last financial year.

The current Trustees are listed at Appendix 11.

CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL FRIENDS

Chichester Cathedral Friends (CCF) is a registered Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) which exists to support the ministry and mission of Chichester Cathedral. CCF provides one of many ways for people to become involved with and contribute to the life and work of the Cathedral. The charity is managed and run by volunteers and has approximately 1,350 members who come from the Cathedral congregation, the city, the diocese and beyond. CCF organises social, cultural and educational events and funds a wide variety of projects, large and small, in response to requests from the Cathedral Chapter.

FINANCIAL REVIEW OF THE CATHEDRAL'S ACTIVITIES

Introduction

The financial statements for the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 and the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals, as specified by the Church Commissioners under section 27 of the Cathedral Measures 1999. The regulations were updated in February 2015 following the adoption of FRS 102.

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of Chapter and its wholly owned subsidiary company, Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

As stated in the notes to the financial statements there are a number of entities that are related to the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral but are not deemed to be under the control of Chapter and therefore are not consolidated within these financial statements.

Overview of the Financial Activities

Total Income from all activities amounted to £3,966,771 (2017 £3,466,966)

Chapter has again been very fortunate to receive both legacies and a number of grants and donations during the year and these are detailed below.

Total expenditure amounted to £3,873,438 (2017 £3,453,175).

Chapter closely manages its operating budget within its Unrestricted Funds and, with its senior management team, has worked hard to reduce an operating deficit in recent years. This year the operating deficit reduced to £152,902 with a budget for 2018/19 set at close to break-even.

The overall operating surplus arising from all activities amounts to £93,333 This surplus may be analysed as follows:

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited made a loss for the year of £55,994 which was consolidated into the Unrestricted fund. This compares to a profit of £82,492 for the previous financial year.

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During the year the Cathedral received the latest triennial valuation of its share of the Churchworkers Pension Fund deficit, which was valued at £156,000. A repayment plan has been agreed over a number of years to minimise the impact on cashflow.

The Cathedral also undertook revaluations of its investment and non-investment property portfolio during the year, as it is required to do every five years. The exercise identified an overall increase in value of £4,579,346

The surplus arising under Endowment funds – other than legacies and other gifts received in the year - is £98,962. This was transferred to the Unrestricted fund for Chapter to spend on its day to day activities.

After unrealised gains and losses from investments, property and a revision to the pension fund deficit are added to the operating surplus/deficits the overall surplus was £4,470,448 (2017 £350,040) which can be analysed as follows:

This compares with total funds at 31 March 2017 amounting to £36,796,334

During the year Chapter together with the Finance Committee and Auditors carried out another detailed review of the funds in all categories to ensure wherever possible a reduction in the number of funds and amalgamate where the purpose and nature of the fund are the same. The aim of this exercise being to reduce the administrative costs associated with running the various funds as well as securing the longevity of certain activities, such as music, at the Cathedral by providing increased scale through the newly consolidated reserves.

Financial Forecast

Whilst Chapter has enjoyed an overall surplus for the year as a result of non-operational gains and losses on its property revaluations there remain significant financial challenges going forward. Putting aside non-operational unrealized gains which come from the capital growth in its assets, then the Cathedral is operationally in deficit, only achieving breakeven through gifts, donations and legacies to Restricted and Endowment Funds.

The Chapter is focussing on increasing both the Cathedral's income and also the utilisation of its existing portfolio of investments and properties. The Cathedral is actively reviewing working practices and processes to ensure the efficient and effective control of all expenditures, in addition the restructure of the Enterprises business remains a top priority.

Chapter will also be placing special focus on the overall approach to fundraising across the spectrum of the Cathedral's activities to ensure that adequate funds are in place to meet all of the key elements of the running of the Cathedral; including fabric, music and moreover its general operations.

Risk Assessment

Risk Identification, Assessment and Mitigation are integral parts of the Chapter's management task and are continuously reviewed. Since nearly half of the unrestricted income comes from commercial rents the most obvious risk is from an economic downturn forcing retail outlets out of business with a resultant loss of this rental income. For this reason Chapter is seeking to increase revenue from other sources and ensure its portfolio is as resilient as possible.

Reserves Policy

It is Chapter's policy that free unrestricted funds should be readily available as a reserve sufficient to provide Chichester Cathedral with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its charitable objectives for the foreseeable future. Free Unrestricted Reserves are defined as being consolidated unrestricted funds, less unrestricted fixed physical assets.

It is hoped, that by maintaining a reasonable level of Free Unrestricted Reserves the Cathedral is protected against unforeseen loss of income from giving, grants or other sources and has a buffer against unplanned exceptional financial expenditure.

Chapter's Free Unrestricted Reserves should be maintained at a level which is at least equivalent to three months expenditure.

Free reserves carried forward at 31 March 2018 amount to £1,176,134 compared with an estimate of three months expenditure amounting to approximately £400,000

Chapter reviews the amount of reserves that it requires on an annual basis to ensure that they are adequate to fulfil the Cathedral's continuing obligations.

Investment & Cash Policy

Under the Cathedrals Measure 1999 Chapter may invest the Cathedral's funds in any of the following:

- Land.
- Funds administered for the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England by CCLA Investment Management Limited.
- Investments in which the Trustees may invest under the general power of investment in the Trustee Act 2000.
- The improvement or development of property belonging to the Cathedral, except that endowment funds may not be used to improve or develop the Cathedral itself and its ancillary buildings.

Chapter seeks the maximum yield to be prudently achieved from a mixture of bonds and equities to deliver the mission of the Cathedral. Over a period of years the income and capital values should grow fast enough to counteract the effects of the rise in RPI.

During this year the blended average yield has been approx 4.1% from a mixed portfolio of M&G Charifund / Charibond units and CCLA investment funds with an average across all the funds of about 92% in equities.

The Finance Committee reviews the holdings at its regular meetings and monitors performance against other common investment funds in the charitable field. The Committee also monitors costs and ethical investment considerations.

Administrative Office

We have audited the financial statements of the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral ("the Chapter") for the year ended 31 March 2018 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, the Consolidated and Chapter only balance sheets, the Consolidated Cashflow statement and the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) including FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

This report is made solely to the Cathedral Chapter, as a body, in accordance with the regulations made under Section 27 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Cathedral Chapter as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

In our opinion the financial statements;

- give a true and fair view of the state of the group's and of the Chapter's affairs as at 31 March 2018, of its incoming resources and application of resources for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals, as specified by the Church Commissioners under section 27 of the Cathedral Measures 1999.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the group in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. THE CHAPTER OF CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2018

BASIS OF PREPARATION

The Cathedral constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals issued in February 2015 by the Cathedral Administration and Finance Association, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of the Chapter and of its wholly owned subsidiary company Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

INCOME

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the Cathedral is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations, legacies and grants to be recognised the Cathedral will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the income and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained, then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the Cathedral and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

THE CATHEDRAL, ITS ANCILLARY BUILDINGS AND THE INVENTORY

In accordance with the Guidelines on English Anglican Cathedral Accounts, no value is attributed in the balance sheet to the Cathedral and its ancillary buildings as it is an inalienable and historic building for which no reliable cost information or conventional valuation basis is available.

No value is attributed to items included in the Cathedral inventory which comprises items of architectural, archaeological, artistic or historic interest.

EQUIPMENT AND PLANT

Chapter:-

In accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulation for English Anglican Cathedrals plant, machinery, office equipment, furniture and fittings and computer equipment are written off on acquisition.

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited:-

Assets with an initial cost price which exceeds £500 are capitalised and depreciation is provided to write down the cost of all tangible fixed assets by equal annual instalments over their expected useful economic lives. The rates generally applicable are:-

Furniture and equipment 10% and 20% on cost Fittings in premises 10% on cost Computer equipment 25% on cost

THE CHAPTER OF CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2018

INVESTMENT PROPERTY

Investment properties are initially measured at cost and subsequently are included at fair value of the freehold and lease investments.

The non-investment properties are included at a nominal value.

LISTED INVESTMENTS

Investments are included in the financial statements as follows:

- (a) Investments are shown at their fair value on 31st March 2018.
- (b) Realised gains and losses are calculated as the difference between their market value on the date of disposal and their market value on the previous balance sheet date.

STOCKS

Shop and refectory stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

VALUE ADDED TAX

A group registration for the Chapter and Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd is in operation. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of the items reported in the financial statements.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO PENSION SCHEMES

The pension costs charged to the accounts represent the amount of the contributions paid to both the Defined Benefit and Pension Builders Schemes in respect of the accounting period.

FUNDS

The financial statements include the following funds:-

- (a) Endowment funds those where there is no power to spend the capital
- (b) Restricted funds those where there are specific conditions attached to the expenditure of either capital or income or both
- (c) Unrestricted funds those where both capital and income may be spent at the discretion of the Chapter.

Over 565 volunteers offer time and talents to the Cathedral in numerous capacities in varying degrees.

15 Pensions

Clergy pensions are the liability of the Church Commissioners who pay contributions to the Church of England Funded Pensions Scheme.

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral participates in the Church of England Defined Benefits Scheme (DBS), part of the Church Workers Pensions Fund, for employees who joined the staff before 31st December 2002 and the Church of England Contribution Scheme (DCS). At 31st March 2018 the Chapter had no active members and 10 deferred pension members in the Fund. The assets of the fund are held separately from those of the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral.

The Defined Benefits scheme was the subject of a full actuarial valuation as at 31 December 2016. The fund as it related to the Chapter was shown to be in deficit. The total deficit was assessed to be £156,000. Chapter has entered into a revised payment arrangement to eliminate the deficit arising. Annual payments of £17,649 will be made to cease by 31 March 2026.

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral has agreed to pay the share of this deficit as it relates to the one employee of the scheme who is employed by the subsidiary Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

Full provision has been made in these financial statements for the deficit as noted above.

In addition contribution rates have increased from 1 April 2015 to a total of 37.9% (employers 24.7% and employees 13.2%).

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral also participates in a stakeholder defined contribution scheme. Contributions to this scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise.

16 Expenses of members of the Chapter

During the year 7 members (2017: 7) of Chapter had expenses reimbursed by the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral. The amount reimbursed was £7,647 (2017 £8,727).


