The Library Team would like to invite you to 'Behind the Library Door' on the first Tuesday of each month in 2020. You will first encounter 40 spiral steps, but it will be well worth the climb. We look forward to showing you some of the treasures housed in the Library from our collection of over 9000 books. A fascinating free Exhibition revealing the important relationship between Henry Moore and his patron Walter Hussey (former Dean of Chichester) has opened at Pallant House Gallery, running until Sunday 8th March. This is their first exhibition exploring Hussey's patronage of Henry Moore, and reveals the important relationship between the two men. It captures key moments in Henry Moore's career including his Surrealist drawings, his drawings of wartime shelters and mines in the pits of Yorkshire; his 1940s lithographs and his late work including the magnificent and mysterious Elephant Skull album (1970). Through the display of other works bequeathed by various collectors, the exhibition will provide an insight into how Moore was collected and supported in the 20th century.

Be Still: The next meetings of the Chichester Contemplative Prayer Group, that explores silent prayer in the Christian tradition, are on Tuesdays 7th and 21st January (7.15pm for 7.30pm start, finishing 8.45pm) in 4 Canon Lane. Drawn from Reflections for the Unfolding Year' the specific focus for the evenings will be *The Generosity of God - Kings 17; John 2: 1-10'* (7th) and *Watching and waiting - Psalm 48: 10;* Luke 2: 25-28(21st).

Spring Lecture Series: Thursday 9th January, 6.30pm, Vicars' Hall. Lecture: *The Reformation of the Heart: Revolution and Mystical Spirituality in 17th Century Britain.* Dr Sarah Apetrei, Director of Graduate Studies in the Faculty of Theology and Religion, University of Oxford, explores how religious thinkers responded to the Civil Wars in the British Isles in the seventeenth century. Epiphany Procession: Sunday 12th January at 6pm. We celebrate the arrival of the three wise men at Bethlehem in this special Cathedral service, featuring a tableau recreation of the nativity scene, with music from the Cathedral Choir and recorder ensemble *Fontanella*. The Feast of the Epiphany recalls the visit of the Magi, the wise men, to the infant Jesus, as recounted in the second chapter of St Matthew's Gospel.

The Bible has much to say of the journeying of the people of God and Christianity from early times was called 'The Way'. This service takes the form of a procession. It recalls a journey, and teaches us about the Christian life as a journey of faith. The response of the wise men, when they reached Bethlehem, was worship, and worship means offering: 'They fell down and worshipped him and, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts.'

Chichester Singers in Concert: Saturday 19th January at 7.30pm.

Come and join us for a concert of contrasting works from the 18th and 20th centuries, performed by the Chichester Singers. Two tuneful Haydn choral works (the 'Little Organ' Mass and Insanae et vanae curae) are complemented by a delightful chamber orchestral piece – Mozart's Divertimento in D (K136) which demonstrates why the young Mozart's works were so admired, even in his own lifetime.

The second half of the concert will feature the dramatic Cantata of *Saint Nicolas* by Britten. Written in 1948 it tells the story of the legendary Saint Nicolas, (the 4th

century Bishop of Myra, Lycia) who became the Patron Saint of children and the inspiration for Santa Claus. Tickets £10-£28 are available from www.ticketsource.co.uk/the-chichester-singers

The Cathedral's Assistant Organist Timothy Ravalde performs Olivier Messiaen's organ work *La Nativite du Seigneur* in this special free performance on Saturday 25th January at 6.30pm. Timothy Ravalde is the Assistant Organist of Chichester Cathedral, where he is responsible for accompanying the daily choral services and assisting with the training of the choir. With the Cathedral Choir he has played for numerous recordings, broadcasts, concerts and tours. He is also the Musical Director of Fernhurst Choral Society, with whom he has conducted a wide range of the major oratorio repertoire.

The Cathedral is delighted to announce the appointment of Duncan Irvine as a new Lay Member of Chapter, the body of both Clergy and Lay staff that determine the policy for administering the Cathedral. Duncan previously served as Chair of the Finance Committee.

Duncan was born and raised in Canada to Scottish parents, and his strong attachment to Britain and love of history was instilled from birth. Duncan came to the UK when he was 18 as an undergraduate at St Andrews University, followed by a postgraduate course at the London School of Economics.
