THE CATHEDRAL'S FUTURE PLANS

This report is written in the aftermath of almost a year of constant planning, re-planning and adjustment driven by the changing course of the pandemic. More than ever before, plans are subject to change...

Nevertheless, the Chapter maintains a confident vision of a church rooted in prayer, study and community in support of its Christian mission. Its worship will flourish in a combination of live and digital settings - as the pandemic and vaccination programme allows – with continued adjustments as we find new ways to worship in a post-pandemic world. The provision of digital worship will continue to extend in order to share the glory of the Cathedral's worship with a wider audience. Its music will adjust to evolving advice and regulation, but always delivering the highest standard of choral worship. Chapter will also consider how the voices of girls may be heard in its singing in the future.

Christian teaching will be central to the Cathedral's plans in the coming years, including new opportunities for vocational teaching. New study days will be joined by placement opportunities for those in Initial Ministerial Education (IME) An expansion of our online learning offering to enable a range of introductory Christian theological courses and lectures aimed at laypeople across the Diocese and beyond. The greater employment of digital resources for visitor engagement both inside the Cathedral and online will be part of a broader improvement of interpretation alongside consideration of how visitors might be encouraged to donate more in support of the Cathedral in future. A new approach to relationships with schools in the aftermath of the pandemic will be considered, refreshing our school visits and family offering to engage with children's spirituality.

The Cathedral's facilities for worshipers, visitors and event attendees will be improved by the installation of new toilet facilities off its North Transept, better presented and better located than those they replace off the South-West Lawn. New self-catering suites in the Treasury Building will help to generate extra income from staying guests to support the Cathedral in its mission, and further opportunities to increase income from Close property will be considered. Chapter will work more closely with property management partners to further enhance the service it provides to tenants and the way that it cares for its many listed properties.

Work will continue to seek funds to complete the replacement of the Cathedral's failing copper roof, with just the main Nave still to complete. The Cathedral's ability to communicate effectively with its supporters will be enhanced by the implementation of a single contact database for Chapter, Restoration and Development Trust and Cathedral Friends. New lighting for the Cathedral well designed, part of a broader ambition to become more sustainable aiming for silver Eco-church designation in the medium term, followed by the achievement of net-zero by 2030.

STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT (GOVERNANCE)

CONSTITUTION AND STATUTES

The Cathedral is governed by the Cathedrals Measure 1999 and its resulting Constitution and Statutes that came into effect in September 2000. The Constitution and Statutes require that any person or body having functions under these instruments shall have due regard to the fact that the Cathedral is the seat of the Bishop of Chichester and a centre of worship and mission.

The authorities in this section each have a specific role in the governance of the Cathedral.

THE CHAPTER OF THE CATHEDRAL

Under the Constitution of the Cathedral, Chapter shall consist of the Dean (Chairman) and all Residentiary Canons of the Cathedral; one member of the College of Canons elected by the College; between two and six other persons appointed jointly by the Bishop and Chapter; and the Communar.

Chapter welcomed its new Chancellor, Revd Dr Daniel Inman in October 2019, and Finance Committee Chairman Duncan Irvine in December 2019. It will continue to recruit lay members of Chapter as appropriate.

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of the Chapter to direct and oversee the administration of the affairs of the Cathedral having regard to the views of the Bishop, the College of Canons and the Cathedral Council and in particular to:

- Order the worship and promote the mission of the Cathedral.
- Formulate, after consultation with the Bishop, proposals in connection with the general direction and mission of the Cathedral and submit them to the Council for its advice.
- Prepare an annual budget for the Cathedral.
- Submit to the Council the annual report and audited accounts prepared by the Chapter and such other reports as may be requested by the Council on any matter concerning the Cathedral.
- Submit to the College of Canons the annual report and audited accounts prepared as aforesaid.
- Keep under review the Constitution and Statutes of the Cathedral.
- Manage all property vested in the Cathedral and the income accruing from it and, in particular, ensure
 that the necessary repairs and maintenance in respect of the Cathedral and its contents and other
 buildings and monuments are carried out.
- Perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

The Chapter is also responsible under the requirements laid down by the Church Commissioners under the powers given them by Section 27 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999 for:

- Preparing and publishing an annual report and audited accounts which give a true and fair view of the financial activities for each financial year and of the assets, liabilities and funds at the end of each financial year of Chichester Cathedral and its connected entities.
- Stating that they have complied in all material respects with the guidelines on the subject prepared by the Association of English Cathedrals or describing which recommendations have not been complied with and giving reasons for non-compliance.
- Selecting suitable accounting policies and then applying them consistently.

- Making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- Keeping proper accounting records, from which the financial position of the Cathedral can be ascertained with reasonable accuracy at any time.
- Safeguarding the assets of the Cathedral and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Cathedral is a Public Benefit entity and in setting the aims of the Cathedral Chapter has had due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on Public Benefit.

New members of Chapter undergo a thorough induction to brief them on their obligations, including briefings from the Cathedral's specialist staff and specific information about the Cathedral Constitution and Statutes and the Cathedrals Measure 1999. The Cathedral's structure, decision-making processes and the financial performance of the Cathedral are also addressed. Members of Chapter are encouraged to attend appropriate training events, especially those provided throughout the year by the Association of English Cathedrals.

The pay of senior staff is reviewed annually, and increases are considered by Chapter in the context of average wage inflation in the charitable sector and the wider economy. When reviewing senior roles Chapter benchmarks pay levels against similar roles in other Cathedrals of a similar size, in other comparable charitable organisations and in the wider region. Clergy stipend levels are set nationally by the Church Commissioners.

THE CATHEDRAL COUNCIL

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of the Council to further and support the work of the Cathedral, spiritual, pastoral, evangelistic and ecumenical, reviewing and advising upon the direction and oversight of that work by the Chapter.

The Bishop, as Visitor, is invited to attend as an advisor and non-voting member.

The Council is therefore both an advisory and consultative body and it has been meeting twice a year since its inauguration in January 2001. During the period of this report the Council has met to be briefed and to discuss a range of topics:

- Appraising the Chapter's annual report and commenting on the wide range of Cathedral activities contained therein.
- Reviewing the Accounts for 2018/2019.
- Receiving briefs from the chairmen of the various Cathedral committees.
- The implementation of the Cathedrals Working Group report.
- Cathedral Fundraising

The members of the Cathedral Council are listed at Appendix 4.

THE COLLEGE OF CANONS

The College of Canons is formed from the Dean, Residentiary Canons, Lay Members of Chapter, the Bishops Suffragan, the Archdeacons, thirty-one Prebendary Canons and up to five Lay Canons (none of whom have been appointed to date). Two members are elected to the Cathedral Council. One member is elected to Chapter. The Communar acts as Secretary.

The College of Canons shall:

- Meet annually on a day as near as convenient to the Feast of All Saints, whenever the Bishop desires to seek its counsel or advice on any matter, whenever it is required to make an election or, if a request for a meeting were made by not less than two-thirds of its members.
- Receive and consider the annual report and audited accounts.
- Discuss such matters concerning the Cathedral as may be raised by any of its members.
- Perform such functions as may be prescribed.

THE BISHOP

The Cathedral is the Mother Church of the Diocese and values its central role in the Diocese's worshipping life and its close relationship with the Bishop of Chichester and his team. The principal seat of the Bishop is in the Cathedral and the Bishop presides regularly at services including ordinations. In the last year we have continued to enjoy the number of services which have seen the licensing and welcoming of significant Diocesan appointments in the Cathedral.

FABRIC ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Under the Care of Cathedrals Measure 1990 (as amended in 2008 and 2011), the Fabric Advisory Committee (FAC) is responsible to the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England (CFCE) and considers applications from the Chapter in regard to proposed development of and changes to the Cathedral's fabric. It also advises Chapter on the care, conservation, repair and development of the Cathedral and meets three times a year.

The ten members of this committee serve for a period of five years and may be re-appointed. The members appoint a Chairman from among their own number. The Communar is the FAC Secretary. The Dean, Surveyor of the Fabric, Consultant Archaeologist and Head of Estates attend meetings of the Committee and are entitled to speak but not to vote. Other Chapter members are free to attend if they wish.

At the date of this report, the committee was at full strength with the Reverend Canon Christopher Irvine having attended his first meeting in February 2020, replacing the Reverend Canon Jeremy Davies who resigned in October 2019.

Over the course of the year the committee considered the development and progress of the following key projects:

- Cathedral's high copper roofs: replacement with historically accurate lead
- Cathedral lighting project
- North Transept toilets development
- Cathedral font: adaptations to plinth
- Cathedral nave seating frontals
- Treasury building: conversion into self-contained apartments
- · Romanesque Reliefs: ongoing monitoring
- Cathedral Inventory: ongoing updates

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee meets four times a year.

The Committee consists of a Chairman and up to four other members appointed by Chapter for their expertise and experience in the field of finance and investment management. Chapter members are the Dean, Precentor and Communar with the Chapter Accountant as another member.

New Chairman, Mr Duncan Irvine, and committee members, Mr Justin Harrington and Mr Ian Buckley, joined the Committee in Spring 2019. Mr Ian Maclennan joined later in 2019.

CATHEDRAL COMMUNITY ROLL

Membership of the Cathedral Roll is open to anyone aged sixteen or over who worships regularly at the Cathedral, is resident in the Close or holds office linked to the Cathedral. There is an annual meeting of those on the Cathedral Roll, chaired by the Dean, at which elections take place to the Cathedral Council, the Cathedral Community Committee and the Chichester Deanery Synod.

CATHEDRAL COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

The Cathedral Community Committee meets at least four times a year to advise the Chapter on all matters affecting the Cathedral Community and to undertake such functions as may be delegated to it by Chapter.

THE CATHEDRAL'S ACTIVITIES DURING THE YEAR

In normal years this section can run to many pages. However, this year is far from normal. The Cathedral has responded to the many challenges of the pandemic since it began in early 2020, and has prioritised the management of immediate financial matters and the support for funding applications over the swift publication of retrospective accounts. Consequently the start of the 2019/20 year in review is approaching two years from the publication date of this report and the world of April 2019 seems very distant from the one we view today. Our focus, and that of our supporters, is on the present and the future. On this occasion we have therefore opted to present a much shorter and simpler review of the year in question.

The undoubted highlight of the year in both worship and musical terms was the Southern Cathedrals Festival held in Chichester 18-21 July 2019. It featured three concerts with the combined choirs of Chichester, Winchester and Salisbury, plus special services, recitals and sparkling evening hospitality events - a great celebration of cathedral music and wonderfully supported by the Chichester Cathedral Friends. The inaugural Order of St Richard Award Ceremony held 5 October 2019 recognised and celebrated exceptional service to the Diocese of Chichester, parishes, and local communities. Significant installations during the year included the Chancellor, the Archdeacon of Chichester, the Diocesan Director of Ordinands, six Canons, and Archbishop Angaelos of the Coptic Church as a Canon of Honour. There were also special services for the 100th anniversary of Save the Children, the 30th anniversary of local homelessness charity Stonepillow, plus a celebration of Sussex Livery. This was the last full year as Precentor at the Cathedral for the Revd Canon Tim Schofield. Tim's retirement came in June 2020 as the first wave of Covid-19 was at its height, but he was able to return to preach and say goodbyes to a distanced congregation in October. His preaching and pastoral ministry will be particularly missed and we wish Tim and Julie all the best for a happy retirement.

The Cathedral's Learning and Engagement provision has undergone significant change since the year in question, during which there was a great deal of activity. Highlights included the work of the Young Ambassadors for Social Action in helping the Cathedral community and beyond to ponder what it means to be live sustainably in a climate crisis, and the opportunity for local schoolchildren (and Cathedral staff) to meet Holocaust Survivor, Stephen Frank BEM. The 'Live Better Together' series of events, in partnership with other faiths, explored what peace means in the local community and the wider world. In April 2019 we welcomed 70 asylum seekers to the Cathedral in a day trip organised by Friends without Borders, and throughout the year our Family Activity Days saw us welcome ever larger numbers of children with their parents and guardians to the Cathedral during the school holidays. 2020 was launched with a Spring Lecture Series curated by the Chancellor that (rather conveniently) explored the theme 'God in a Time of Crisis' with five theological responses to a moment of crisis in British history.

We welcomed 225,050 visitors to the Cathedral during the year, including school visits and pre-booked groups. This figure is lower than those quoted in previous years as we introduced a new, more accurate, counting methodology. It was, in fact, a busy year for visitors until numbers started to dip in late February in response to the spread of Covid-19. The year saw the appointment of a new Head Welcomer, Sue Lines and fresh interpretation installed to sit alongside some of the Cathedral's artworks.

There were also changes to the way the Cathedral manages and supports its volunteers as an internal restructure led to responsibility for volunteers transferring to the Human Resources team, with Receptionist Carolyn Atkinson moving into a new role of Volunteer and HR Co-ordinator. A renewed focus on volunteer support will, in future, aim to complement the support already received from volunteer team leaders.

A new Volunteer Strategy was developed, to ensure that at Chichester Cathedral we are as good as we can be at recruiting, engaging and retaining our volunteers. A survey helped us to understand more about the views and

experience of our volunteers as well as what we might do better? New processes were introduced for recruitment and induction, with new volunteers completing a Volunteer Application Form, Volunteer Information Form and signing a Volunteer Agreement. In time this process will be rolled-out to include all volunteers.

A new Visitor Care Course was developed with a training provider and endorsed by the Volunteer Committee and volunteer Team Leaders. Sessions for staff and visitor-facing volunteers began in November 2019 and generated very positive feedback but sadly they came to a halt in March 2020 due to Covid-19. More staff trained as Dementia Friends Champions and work continues towards creating a dementia friendly community at Chichester Cathedral, where all staff and volunteers will be made Dementia Friends and people with dementia will be understood and respected. Lanyards and photo ID cards were introduced for all Cathedral staff and volunteers in late 2019 to improve our security and to enable our colleagues, visitors and members of the public to identify each other.

The multi-year project to replace the Cathedral's failing copper roofs with lead continued, with the completion of phase two: the transepts and lantern tower. This crucial intervention was only possible thanks to the financial support of the Cathedral's Restoration and Development Trust. Just the main Nave now remains. Elsewhere in the Cathedral Close, the Finance Team moved its operations to the Royal Chantry Offices, vacating the Treasury Building in preparation for its conversion to self-catering suites for staying guests. In Autumn 2019 the Cathedral opened a new holiday let, the sensitively renovated and decorated four-bedroom house at 2 St Faiths which overlooks the Cathedral's East end.

SAFEGUARDING

Chapter is committed to the protection of children and adults at risk of harm who are visiting the cathedral, the cathedral choristers and those attending services, as well as any employees, trainees and volunteers.

In accordance with the House of Bishops Policy documents the Cathedral has a written Safeguarding Policy and Guidelines – the policy is available in the Cathedral and on its website and was updated on a number of occasions during the year. The ongoing Service Level Agreement with the Diocesan Safeguarding Team, with its Deputy Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor also being the Cathedral's Safeguarding Officer, has continued to be a successful and highly valued model. Chapter wishes to record its thanks to Mrs Morag Keane, who retired from this role in summer 2020. She has been succeeded by Mrs Barbara Storer.

The Cathedral's Safeguarding Team, including its Safeguarding Officer, met regularly during the year to consider safeguarding issues and the continuous improvement of the Cathedral's provision. In December 2019 it celebrated the achievement of Chichester Diocese's 'Simple Quality Protects' Quality Assurance award, the most challenging aspect of which was the training in safeguarding awareness of hundreds of Cathedral volunteers.

The Safeguarding Officer reported to Chapter twice during this period, including an annual report in December 2019 which enabled Chapter to submit its first annual report to the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisory Panel in early 2020.

Chapter is grateful to those who serve today on its safeguarding group, especially Mrs Ruth Taunt, the independent member of the committee.

CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL RESTORATION AND DEVELOPMENT TRUST

The Trust was formed in 1980 and since then has raised money for the restoration and development of Chichester Cathedral, other buildings within its precincts, its music foundation, its learning and engagement offering and such other charitable objects and activities undertaken by the Chapter.

2019/20 saw a focus on raising funds for re-covering the Cathedral's roofs, including the completion of phase 2, the Transepts and Lantern. The Trust team also raised funds to support the Cathedral's work with families and young people and to support the provision of choral music. Further funding was provided for the maintenance and improvement work to the organ. There was an exciting initiative to establish an American Patrons fundraising committee to develop support from American donors. Representatives attended the Annual Conference of the Consortium of Endowed Episcopalian Parishes in Louisville, Kentucky.

A spectacular fundraising dinner was held in the Cathedral Nave, hosted by the Dean with special guest and speaker Hugh Bonneville. At a smaller scale, a programme of 'In Conversation' events including Oscar-winning composer Rachel Portman at Rolls Royce, and actress and Roof Appeal Patron Dame Patricia Routledge at Wiston House.

The Trust engaged with City Livery Companies, inviting them to a Thanksgiving Evensong Service to recognise their support for the Cathedral and the Diocese. It also developed new literature to help donors to understand how to implement legacy giving to the Cathedral. Finally, as the year closed, a new Fundraising Manager, Lindsay Dunlop, joined to bring the team's fundraising capacity back to full strength.

FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR END MARCH 2020

Covid-19 Statement

Whilst the 2019/20 financial year end for Chapter, and its wholly owned trading subsidiary Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd (CCEL), was only a few days after the start of national lockdown in the middle of March 2020, the effects of Covid-19 both before and after year end were profound both operationally and financially.

Chapter started to see a significant decrease in congregations, tourism, tours, visits and events during the last quarter of the 2019/20 financial year and commercial tenants started to withhold payments as high street footfall evaporated and retail revenues collapsed. Post year end, and with the severity of the crisis and its corresponding financial implications becoming apparent, Chapter took the difficult decision to restructure the Learning and Engagement department and substantially reduce its future offering, refocussing the Cathedral's ambitions regarding Christian theological study, evangelism and mission through the work of the Chancellor. It also furloughed significant numbers of the remaining operational staff throughout the summer and into the autumn. In addition Chapter has worked closely with its professional property advisers and tenants to maintain commercial leases. Nevertheless, the raft of retailers entering CVAs and going into liquidation has affected the commercial property market and yields. Restructuring provisions and bad debt provisions have been made in the financial year end March 2020 accounts for decisions made by Chapter post year end during the summer and early autumn.

In CCEL all aspects of operations began to experience the effect of Covid-19 from February 2020, with cancellations in hospitality and events and a marked decrease in footfall in the café and shop followed by full closure in March. Despite some immediate grant support, it was felt that the fundamental changes in long term behaviours and regulations in dining, events and tourism meant that the existing operating models in the café and shop were not viable in the coming years. The Board of CCEL and Chapter subsequently took the difficult decision to close of the café and events business for the foreseeable future, with a medium term closure of the shop to be succeeded by a more volunteer-led model operating from inside the Cathedral when shop reopening is allowed and the visitor numbers return consistently to a significant level. Full provision for post year end decisions and known restructuring costs have been taken within the financial year to March 2020. However it is still envisaged that 2020 / 21 will be very tough trading year even with a much simplified business model.

Chapter forecasts several challenging financial years, stretching into 2022 and beyond. In recent years it has been operating at around breakeven having worked hard to reduce deficits, but the legacy left by Covid-19 will present new and ongoing challenges. The decisions taken since the start of the pandemic have helped to safeguard the Cathedral's immediate future and Chapter will continue to consider how best to deliver its mission in a much-changed landscape.

It is worth noting that, subsequent to the March 2020 year end, the Cathedral has received significant grants and donations from various funders to support aspects of its activity such as music, estates and communications to ensure that core skills are retained for a future when activity can resume. Now, more than ever, the Cathedral will rely on donors, grants and congregational giving and Chapter would like to record its gratitude to all who give so generously.

Introduction

The financial statements for the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 and the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals, as specified by the Church Commissioners under section 27 of the Cathedral Measures 1999. The regulations were updated in December 2018 following revisions to FRS 102.

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of Chapter and its wholly owned subsidiary company, Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

As stated in the notes to the financial statements there are a number of entities that are related to the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral but are not deemed to be under the control of Chapter and therefore are not consolidated within these financial statements.

Overview of the Financial Activities

Total Income from all activities amounted to £ 3,887,857 (2018/19 £4,498,044)

A marked downturn in income was driven by planned year by year phasing on the donations for the roof refurbishment, and the effects of covid-19 on café, events and donations at the end of the year.

Chapter has again been very fortunate to receive a number of grants and donations during the year and some of these are detailed below. The Cathedral is extremely grateful for all the donations it receives including many from people who contribute regularly.

Total expenditure before gains and losses amounted to £4,456,309 (2018/19 £4,656,395).

Chapter closely manages its operating budget within its Unrestricted Funds and, with its senior management team, has worked hard to manage its finances in recent years. However the planned spend on the conversion of buildings to holiday lets (utilising some of the surplus generated in 2018/19) combined with the effects of Covid-19 meant that in this year the consolidated result for the unrestricted part of Chapter was a deficit of £307,822 before gains or losses on investments and properties.

The Cathedral also undertook revaluations of some of its investment property portfolio during the year as a result of refurbishments it carried out and made a notional gain over book value in those cases.

Overall property and investment gains/losses (realised and unrealised) amounted to a contributing loss of £640,105. This mainly reflected a dramatic fall in the stock market valuations of the Cathedral's holdings as the year end came shortly after the stock market crash as the potential impact of Covid-19 became apparent. Equity valuations subsequently recovered to some degree.

In summary (and including gains and losses on investments), there was a significant deficit arising from all activities amounting to £1,208,557. This arose mainly as a result of losses on equity investments at year-end, operational losses driven by Covid-19, timing on roof refurbishment costs, and refurbishment costs on properties owned by endowment funds. Operational costs included all known costs for restructuring in both Chapter and Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd following the closure of the café and events business and the reduction in learning and engagement capacity, as these decisions were taken post year end but before accounts were signed off.

This deficit may be analysed as follows:

Unrestricted Funds £ 271,523 Restricted Funds £ 735,425 Endowment Funds £ 201,609

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited made a loss for the year of £63,887 which was consolidated into the Unrestricted fund.

The Cathedral continues to make deficit contributions to the Churchworkers Pension Fund, as part of a repayment plan agreed in 2018 which spreads the repayments over a number of years to minimise the impact on cashflow.

The Cathedral continued to support local and national charities with its external giving program which amounted to £21,965 during the year.

Chapter Funds

This compares with total funds at 31 March 2019 amounting to £41,804,539

Chapter's funds are predominantly held in its property portfolio and, to a lesser degree, investments and cash.

Financial Forecast

As mentioned previously Covid-19 will continue to have financial knock-on effects for the Cathedral for some years to come.

Property yields are likely to fall nationally and our equity and investment portfolios have been and will continue to be utilised to cover cashflow requirements. As a result, investment income will inevitably reduce and the property portfolio will require revaluation in the coming years. In addition, events, tourism and visitor income will remain subdued as vaccine rollout continues throughout 2021. Significant restructuring has been carried out, so the cost base is expected to remain fixed and will rise back up as the government winds down its support through the various furlough schemes and staff are better able to fulfil their roles. Chapter remains vigilant to, and is constantly planning for, the ripple effects from the pandemic. This is a challenge Chapter believes it can

meet by the dedicated hard work of its personnel and the support of its congregation and donors. In addition, cash reserves and profitability will be monitored closely and the property portfolio will remain under review, searching for underutilised assets and opportunities.

As part of the recovery program, Chapter will continue to work closely with the Restoration and Development Trust and will collaborate on the overall approach to fundraising, across the whole spectrum of the Cathedral's activities, to ensure that as many potential funders and grant giving bodies are approached as is reasonably practicable.

Risk Assessment

Risk Identification, Assessment and Mitigation are integral parts of the Chapter's management task and are continuously reviewed. Since over a third of its unrestricted income comes from commercial rents the most obvious risk is from a continued economic downturn forcing more retail outlets out of business with a resultant reduction in rental income. For this reason Chapter has been seeking to increase revenue from other sources over the last few years and to that end has repurposed some of its property towards holiday accommodation. In addition, the trading risk within CCEL has been much reduced with the closure of the café and in-house event catering and a simpler operating model across the whole Cathedral should allow costs and risk to be reduced as the Cathedral plots a course back to covering its costs in future years and even generating small surpluses where possible.

Reserves Policy

It is Chapter's policy that free unrestricted funds should be readily available as a reserve sufficient to provide Chichester Cathedral with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its charitable objectives for the foreseeable future. Free Unrestricted Reserves are defined as being consolidated unrestricted funds, less unrestricted fixed physical assets.

It is hoped, that by maintaining a reasonable level of Free Unrestricted Reserves the Cathedral is protected against unforceseen loss of income from giving, grants or other sources and has a buffer against unplanned exceptional financial expenditure.

Chapter's Free Unrestricted Reserves should be maintained at a level which is at least equivalent to three months expenditure.

Free reserves carried forward at 31 March 2020 amount to £995,791 compared with an estimate of three months expenditure amounting to approximately £400,000 (excluding Enterprises which is trading related)

Chapter reviews the amount of reserves that it requires on an annual basis to ensure that they are adequate to fulfil the Cathedral's continuing obligations.

Investment & Cash Policy

Under the Cathedrals Measure 1999 Chapter may invest the Cathedral's funds in any of the following:

- Land.
- Funds administered for the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England by CCLA Investment Management Limited.
- Investments in which the Trustees may invest under the general power of investment in the Trustee Act 2000.
- The improvement or development of property belonging to the Cathedral, except that endowment funds may not be used to improve or develop the Cathedral itself and its ancillary buildings.

Chapter seeks the maximum total return to be prudently achieved from a mixture of bonds and equities, predominantly equities, in order to deliver the mission of the Cathedral. Over a period of years, the income and capital values should grow fast enough to counteract the effects of the rise in RPI.

During this year the blended average yield has been approximately 4.5% from a mixed portfolio of M&G Charifund / Charibond units and CCLA investment funds with an average across all the funds of about 93% in equities.

The Finance Committee reviews the holdings at its regular meetings and monitors performance against other common investment funds in the charitable field. The Committee also monitors costs and ethical investment considerations.

CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ENTERPRISES LIMITED

Chapter solely owns Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd (CCEL) which undertook the commercial activities of the Cathedral Café, Cloisters Shop, Box Office, Vicars Hall, 4 Canon Lane and other holiday accommodation and venues located within the Cathedral precinct.

As a result of the long-term impacts of Covid-19 (as already outline in the Covid-19 statement) the board of CCEL and Chapter took the decision in July 2020 to close the Café, cease in-house event catering, temporarily close the shop, and suspend the food and breakfast offering within its staying accommodation.

In the future CCEL will be a much lower-cost and lower-risk operation focussing solely on accommodation nights, event space hire, and a reduced volunteer-led shop offering within the Cathedral building. The Cathedral will establish partnerships to provide catering direct to clients whilst CCEL charges solely for the hire of the wonderful spaces that can be found around our precincts. The board of CCEL hopes that the revised business with its simpler management requirements will allow it to refocus and grow in a carefully controlled manner as the world emerges from the pandemic.

Chapter has continued to invest in the refurbishment of the old Treasury building and its conversion to aparthotel style rooms. It is envisaged that these rooms will be assimilated into CCEL's staying accommodation offering – alongside bedrooms in 4 Canon Lane and two holiday lets in the early part of 2021 and go on to make a solid financial return in the future for Chapter in support of its mission.

Overall result for the year end March 2020

Overall CCEL made a loss of £63,887 for the year to March 31^{st} 2020 which compares to a small profit of £19,395 in the previous year, being a negative swing of over £83,000 due almost entirely to the effects of Covid-19.

The loss includes provisions made for the closure of the café, shop and events business. These include redundancy costs, stock provisions and fixed asset write downs.

THE CHAPTER OF CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2020

BASIS OF PREPARATION

The Cathedral constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals issued in December 2018 by the Cathedral Administration and Finance Association, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

GOING CONCERN

Chapter consider that there is a reasonable expectation that the Cathedral has and will continue to have adequate resources to operate for the foreseeable future.

The Coviid-19 pandemic has had a material impact on the Cathedral both in terms of its ability to operate and the level of income generated from all sources. Action taken to mitigate the impact of the pandemic is detailed in the Covid-19 statement on page 11 of the annual report.

Given the actions taken and the production of forecasts that show adequate resources are available to contend with any further prolonged lockdown the accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of the Chapter and of its wholly owned subsidiary company Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

INCOME

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the Cathedral is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations, legacies and grants to be recognised the Cathedral will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the income and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained, then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the Cathedral and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

THE CATHEDRAL, IT'S ANCILLARY BUILDINGS AND THE INVENTORY

In accordance with the Guidelines on English Anglican Cathedral Accounts, no value is attributed in the balance sheet to the Cathedral and its ancillary buildings as it is an inalienable and historic building for which no reliable cost information or conventional valuation basis is available.

No value is attributed to items included in the Cathedral inventory which comprises items of architectural, archaeological, artistic or historic interest.

THE CHAPTER OF CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2020

EQUIPMENT AND PLANT

Chapter:-

In accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulation for English Anglican Cathedrals plant, machinery, office equipment, furniture and fittings and computer equipment are written off on acquisition.

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited:-

Assets with an initial cost price which exceeds £500 are capitalised and depreciation is provided to write down the cost of all tangible fixed assets by equal annual instalments over their expected useful economic lives. The rates generally applicable are:-

Furniture and equipment

10% and 20% on cost

Fittings in premises Computer equipment 10% on cost

25% on cost

INVESTMENT PROPERTY

Investment properties are initially measured at cost and subsequently are included at fair value of the freehold and lease investments.

The non-investment properties are included at a nominal value.

LISTED INVESTMENTS

Investments are included in the financial statements as follows:

- (a) Investments are shown at their fair value on 31st March 2020.
- (b) Realised gains and losses are calculated as the difference between their market value on the date of disposal and their market value on the previous balance sheet date.

STOCKS

Shop and refectory stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

VALUE ADDED TAX

A group registration for the Chapter and Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd is in operation. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of the items reported in the financial statements.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO PENSION SCHEMES

The pension costs charged to the accounts represent the amount of the contributions paid to both the Defined Benefit and Pension Builders Schemes in respect of the accounting period.

FUNDS

The financial statements include the following funds:-

- (a) Endowment funds those where there is no power to spend the capital
- (b) Restricted funds those where there are specific conditions attached to the expenditure of either capital or income or both
- (c) Unrestricted funds those where both capital and income may be spent at the discretion of the Chapter.

Over 500 volunteers offer time and talents to the Cathedral in numerous capacities in varying degrees.

15 Pensions

Clergy pensions are the liability of the Church Commissioners who pay contributions to the Church of England Funded Pensions Scheme.

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral participates in the Church of England Defined Benefits Scheme (DBS), part of the Church Workers Pensions Fund, for employees who joined the staff before 31st December 2002 and the Church of England Contribution Scheme (DCS). At 31st March 2018 the Chapter had no active members and 10 deferred pension members in the Fund. The assets of the fund are held separately from those of the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral.

The Defined Benefits scheme was the subject of a full actuarial valuation as at 31 December 2016. The fund as it related to the Chapter was shown to be in deficit. The total deficit was assessed to be £156,000. Chapter has entered into a revised payment arrangement to eliminate the deficit arising. Annual payments of £17,649 will be made to cease by 31 March 2026.

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral has agreed to pay the share of this deficit as it relates to the one employee of the scheme who is employed by the subsidiary Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

Full provision has been made in these financial statements for the deficit as noted above.

In addition contribution rates have increased from 1 April 2015 to a total of 37.9% (employers 24.7% and employees 13.2%).

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral also participates in a stakeholder defined contribution scheme. Contributions to this scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they


