FOREWORD FROM THE DEAN

Thank you for your interest in Chichester Cathedral and its Annual Report on the year 2020/21.

It has been a year of huge challenges in which the Cathedral was closed for worship and all other activities for a period. We were unable to welcome congregations for Holy Week and Easter 2020 and we developed ways of leading people in worship, prayer, and study online. Before the pandemic the word 'live-streaming' was not in our vocabulary: during the year we successfully learned how to include people in our worship and work, broadcasting from homes and gardens until we were once again able to use the Cathedral.

It was sad to lose so many colleagues through restructuring during the year, and I would like to pay tribute to their commitment to the Cathedral over the years and thank them for their contribution to the Cathedral's work.

The Cathedral has continued to change and adapt during the pandemic. We were pleased to be able to take the decision to remain open for worship and prayer during subsequent lockdowns, and the fact that we did so was much appreciated by those who came to pray. It seemed important that the Cathedral should be a place of calm and relative stability in the turbulence of the world around us, a place of witness to the constancy of God's love for us.

I am proud of the way in which all who work, and minister here have continued to adapt to the unprecedented circumstances which we have experienced during the year, enabling the Cathedral to flourish and remain a place where the hope of the Gospel is lived and proclaimed.

I commend our Annual Report to you.

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THE CATHEDRAL'S FUTURE PLANS

This report is written following seventeen months of the Covid-19 pandemic with all the re-planning and adjustment that has necessitated, and just a few months since the Cathedral's last annual report which already reflected on the different realities being faced by the Cathedral. As everyone is aware, during these unprecedented times plans remain subject to change.

Nevertheless, the Chapter maintains a confident vision of a church rooted in prayer, study and community in support of its Christian mission. Its worship will continue to flourish in a combination of live and digital settings, with continued adjustments as we make use of the new technological resources at our disposal and all that has been learned over the past year. Cathedral music will continue to respond to guidance, taking a safe and responsible approach whilst always seeking the highest standard of choral worship. Chapter is considering how the voices of girls may be heard in its singing in the future. Christian teaching will be remain central to the Cathedral's strategic plans, including new opportunities for vocational teaching. There will be placement opportunities for those in Initial Ministerial Education (IME) and this year, will also see the introduction of 'KALEO' (from the Greek, 'I call') – a new network of small groups that will provide a positive new way for people in the Cathedral community and beyond to encounter God through the arts. We will expand our online learning offering to enable a range of other Christian theological courses and lectures aimed at a lay audience across the Diocese and beyond.

We will refresh our approach to school visits – as far as demand and the pandemic allows - and evolve our family offering to engage with children's spirituality.

The Cathedral is looking forward to discussing its safeguarding provision with representatives from the Social Care Institute of Excellence in the Autumn, part of a national programme of Cathedral Safeguarding Audits.

The greater employment of digital resources for enhanced visitor engagement both inside the Cathedral and online will be part of a broader improvement of interpretation. There will also be trials to investigate how to make it easier for visitors to donate more to support the Cathedral's future plans, following the recent example of Cathedrals including Gloucester. The Cathedral's facilities for worshippers, visitors and event attendees will be improved when the new toilet facilities off its North Transept open in August - better presented and better located than those they replace off the South-West Lawn.

New self-catering suites in the Treasury Building opened in May, will help to generate extra income from paying guests to support the Cathedral in its mission, and further opportunities to increase income from Close property will be considered. Chapter will work closely with property management partners to further enhance the service it provides to tenants, and the way that it cares for its many listed properties. Significant and necessary investment is planned during the year into the properties at 4 Vicars Close and 1 St Faiths.

Funds will also be sought to deliver new lighting for the Cathedral for which a preparatory application has been made to the Cathedrals Fabric Commission. The eventual ambitions are to better support the Cathedral's worship within its architectural setting, to better display the spectacular interior for visitors, to reduce maintenance demands of the old, failing lighting system, and to reduce power consumption as part of a broader ambition to achieve silver Eco-church designation in the short term, followed by the achievement of net-zero by 2030. Work will continue to also seek funds to complete the replacement of the Cathedral's failing copper roof, with just the main Nave still to complete.

The Cathedral's ability to communicate effectively with its supporters will be enhanced following the implementation of a single contact database for Chapter, Restoration and Development Trust and Cathedral Friends.

The Cathedral team will work with the partners who form the Chichester Vision Group, in particular exploring the potential to re-imagine the landscape and pedestrian and traffic routing on the Cathedral's North side, seeking to create better space for the city community to enjoy.

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STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT (GOVERNANCE)

CONSTITUTION AND STATUTES

The Cathedral is governed by the Cathedrals Measure 1999 and its resulting Constitution and Statutes that came into effect in September 2000. The Constitution and Statutes require that any person or body having functions under these instruments shall have due regard to the fact that the Cathedral is the seat of the Bishop of Chichester and a centre of worship and mission.

A new Cathedrals Measure was enacted in 2021 and the coming years will see change as its provisions are implemented, including registration of the Cathedral with the Charity Commission.

The authorities in this section each have a specific role in the governance of the Cathedral.

THE CHAPTER OF THE CATHEDRAL

Under the Constitution of the Cathedral, Chapter shall consist of the Dean (Chairman) and all Residentiary Canons of the Cathedral; one member of the College of Canons elected by the College; between two and six other persons appointed jointly by the Bishop and Chapter; and the Communar.

The Cathedral's Precentor, the Revd Canon Tim Schofield, retired during the year in question to many tributes, including in the previous Annual Report. The congregation – and Tim's former colleagues – were delighted to be able to say an in-person 'goodbye', albeit a distanced one, when he returned to preach in October 2020. Following the year in review the Bishop of Chichester appointed a new Treasurer, Revd Dr Vanessa Baron, and Precentor, Revd Dr Jack Dunn. Both will join Chapter in September 2021. Chapter will be seeking new lay members during summer 2021.

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of the Chapter to direct and oversee the administration of the affairs of the Cathedral having regard to the views of the Bishop, the College of Canons and the Cathedral Council and in particular to:

- Order the worship and promote the mission of the Cathedral.
- Formulate, after consultation with the Bishop, proposals in connection with the general direction and mission of the Cathedral and submit them to the Council for its advice.
- Prepare an annual budget for the Cathedral.
- Submit to the Council the annual report and audited accounts prepared by the Chapter and such other reports as may be requested by the Council on any matter concerning the Cathedral.
- Submit to the College of Canons the annual report and audited accounts prepared as aforesaid.
- Keep under review the Constitution and Statutes of the Cathedral.
- Manage all property vested in the Cathedral and the income accruing from it and, in particular, ensure
 that the necessary repairs and maintenance in respect of the Cathedral and its contents and other
 buildings and monuments are carried out.
- Perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

The Chapter is also responsible under the requirements laid down by the Church Commissioners under the powers given them by Section 27 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999 for:

- Preparing and publishing an annual report and audited accounts which give a true and fair view of the financial activities for each financial year and of the assets, liabilities and funds at the end of each financial year of Chichester Cathedral and its connected entities.
- Stating that they have complied in all material respects with the guidelines on the subject prepared by the Association of English Cathedrals or describing which recommendations have not been complied with and giving reasons for non-compliance.
- Selecting suitable accounting policies and then applying them consistently.
- Making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent.

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- Keeping proper accounting records, from which the financial position of the Cathedral can be ascertained with reasonable accuracy at any time.
- Safeguarding the assets of the Cathedral and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Cathedral is a Public Benefit entity and in setting the aims of the Cathedral Chapter has paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on Public Benefit.

New members of Chapter undergo a thorough induction to brief them on their obligations, including briefings from the Cathedral's specialist staff and specific information about the Cathedral Constitution and Statutes and the Cathedrals Measure 1999. The Cathedral's structure, decision-making processes and the financial performance of the Cathedral are also addressed. Members of Chapter are encouraged to attend appropriate training events, especially those provided throughout the year by the Association of English Cathedrals, including safeguarding.

Senior staff remuneration is reviewed annually, and increases are considered by Chapter in the context of average wage inflation in the charitable sector and the wider economy. When reviewing senior roles Chapter benchmarks pay levels against similar roles in other Cathedrals of a similar size, in other comparable charitable organisations and in the wider region. Clergy stipend levels are set nationally by the Church Commissioners.

THE CATHEDRAL COUNCIL

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of the Council to further and support the work of the Cathedral, spiritual, pastoral, evangelistic and ecumenical, reviewing and advising upon the direction and oversight of that work by the Chapter.

The Bishop, as Visitor, is invited to attend as an advisor and non-voting member.

The Council is therefore both an advisory and consultative body and it has been meeting twice a year since its inauguration in January 2001. During the period of this report the Council has met to be briefed and to discuss a range of topics, including:

- The Cathedral's responses to the Covid-19 pandemic.
- Appraising the Chapter's annual report and commenting on the wide range of Cathedral activities contained therein.
- Reviewing the Accounts for 2019/2020.
- Receiving briefs from the chairmen of the various Cathedral committees.

The members of the Cathedral Council are listed at Appendix 4.

THE COLLEGE OF CANONS

The College of Canons is formed from the Dean, Residentiary Canons, Lay Members of Chapter, the Bishops Suffragan, the Archdeacons, thirty-one Prebendary Canons and up to five Lay Canons (none of whom have been appointed to date). Two members are elected to the Cathedral Council. One member is elected to Chapter. The Communar acts as Secretary.

The College of Canons shall:

- Meet annually on a day as near as convenient to the Feast of All Saints, whenever the Bishop desires to seek its counsel or advice on any matter, whenever it is required to make an election or, if a request for a meeting were made by not less than two-thirds of its members.
- Receive and consider the annual report and audited accounts.

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- Discuss such matters concerning the Cathedral as may be raised by any of its members.
- Perform such functions as may be prescribed.

A list of members of the College of Canons is at Appendix 5.

No meeting of the College took place in 2020/21, with members preferring to wait until a meeting in-person at the Cathedral was possible.

THE BISHOP

The Cathedral is the Mother Church of the Diocese and values its central role in the Diocese's worshipping life and its close relationship with the Bishop of Chichester and his team. The principal seat of the Bishop is in the Cathedral and the Bishop presides regularly at services including ordinations. The Bishop was a regular visitor to the Cathedral during the year and the Cathedral and Diocesan teams worked closely together to share major services from the Cathedral with a digital audience through the Diocese.

FABRIC ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Under the Care of Cathedrals Measure 1990 (as amended in 2008 and 2011), the Fabric Advisory Committee (FAC) is responsible to the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England (CFCE) and considers applications from the Chapter in regard to proposed development of and changes to the Cathedral's fabric. It also advises Chapter on the care, conservation, repair and development of the Cathedral and meets three times a year.

The ten members of this committee serve for a period of five years and may be re-appointed. The members appoint a Chairman from among their own number. The Communar is the FAC Secretary. The Dean, Surveyor of the Fabric, Consultant Archaeologist and Head of Estates attend meetings of the Committee and are entitled to speak but not to vote. Other Chapter members are free to attend if they wish.

At the date of this report, the committee was at full strength. The Chapter wishes to express its particular thanks to two long-serving member of the FAC who stepped down during the year:

- Consultant Archaeologist Mr Mark Taylor, who retired after many years of wise counsel and guidance;
- FAC member and renowned sculptor Mr Philip Jackson, who stepped down in early 2021 at the end of the CFCE quinquennium.

Chapter appointed Mr Michael Shapland of UCL to be its Consultant Archaeologist, and stonework specialist Mr Chris Wood to its FAC.

Over the course of the year the committee considered the development and progress of the following key projects:

- Cathedral lighting project
- North Transept toilets development
- Cathedral font: adaptations to plinth
- Romanesque Reliefs: ongoing monitoring to consider whether and when to remove the cover from the second relief
- Cathedral Inventory: ongoing updates

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee meets four times a year.

The Committee consists of a Chair and up to four other external members appointed by Chapter for their expertise and experience in the field of finance and investment management. Chapter members are the Dean, Chancellor and Communar with the Chapter Accountant as attendee.

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CATHEDRAL COMMUNITY ROLL

Membership of the Cathedral Roll is open to anyone aged sixteen or over who worships regularly at the Cathedral, is resident in the Close or holds office linked to the Cathedral. There is an annual meeting of those on the Cathedral Roll, chaired by the Dean, at which elections take place to the Cathedral Council, the Cathedral Community Committee and the Chichester Deanery Synod.

CATHEDRAL COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

The Cathedral Community Committee usually meets at least four times a year to advise the Chapter on all matters affecting the Cathedral Community and to undertake such functions as may be delegated to it by Chapter. However, during the pandemic the Community Committee has not met. Chapter will consider the best future routes to generating engagement from congregation staff and volunteers in the light of the new Cathedrals Measure.

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THE CATHEDRAL'S ACTIVITIES DURING THE YEAR

The entire year in review was during the pandemic, which cast its shadow across all that took place. The constraints were substantial but somehow activity continued.

Worship was shared digitally only in the early part of the year, often from clergy houses as the Cathedral doors were locked. Holy Week and Easter 2020 saw a series of special services, supplemented by online resources including reflections by Canon Roly Riem, Chancellor of Winchester Cathedral. Later, services were streamed live or recorded from the Cathedral and congregations were able to return – pre-booked, distanced, and masked - from early summer. The Dean spoke of the spiritual hunger of the returning congregation, and of the deep silences, as the profundity of live worship was experienced once again. The second lockdown of Winter 2020/21 saw the Cathedral remain open for worship, much appreciated by those who continued to attend. As the year passed the team's digital production skills grew, with important support from Hunter Gatherer Productions, reaching a peak in the lead-up to Christmas with the live Advent Procession, candlelit Christmas Carol Services, and a pre-recorded online Carol Service with readings from key workers around the diocese. The communications team also shared an online Advent calendar showcasing different aspects of Cathedral life during the Christmas period.

The choir was often subject to restrictions but nevertheless delivered whenever it was able to – the peak was perhaps the live broadcast of Choral Evensong on BBC Radio 3 on 18 November 2020, described by Organist, Charles Harrison, as one of the highlights of his time at Chichester. A special service on 13 September 2020 saw the installation of new Suffragan Bishops: Ruth Bushyager as Bishop of Horsham and Will Hazlewood as Bishop of Lewes. Although just beyond the time-period covered by this review it would be remiss not to mention the Choral Evensong held on 16 April 2021 with Thanksgiving for the Life of HRH The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. The Evensong was attended by civic guests following all appropriate Covid-19 protocols - candle stations were made available for all members of the public in the days following the death.

March 2021 saw the installation of new online live-streaming equipment that will allow the Cathedral team to film and stream services themselves, enabling worship from home even when the effects of the pandemic have abated.

The pandemic brought a pause to school visits for the entirety of the year 2020-21 and also contributed to a significant restructuring of the Cathedral's Learning and Engagement department that sought to pivot to a greater focus on Christian theological learning and formation, while retaining a commitment to sustaining the Cathedral's school's engagement. As a result of both financial retrenchment and this strategic change of focus, Chapter sadly bid farewell to Cynara Davies, Sue Poil, Vicky Rowlands and Luna Russell, and appointed Karen Jones as the new Schools and Families Officer in November 2020. This role seeks to sustain the Cathedral's engagement with schools and families, albeit in a limited form, as we slowly rebuild our common life. It has been challenging, with successive waves of lockdowns and the understandable reluctance of schools to make visits.

However, the pandemic also saw the development of greater digital engagement, particularly in adult education and this was expressed in online learning, led by the Chancellor, on five big questions around the Christian faith, the Hebrew Bible and the New Testament (with over 300 people engaging with the resources by the end of the third lecture series). This has formed the basis of a new online partnership with Lichfield to deliver theological learning more widely. Canon Peter Sills also delivered the Lent Lectures on the theme of his book *Light in the Darkness*, which were greatly appreciated. Lent groups studying the epistle of James also went online and were ably led by volunteers within the Cathedral community.

Digital resources for families and schools have also been developed on the Cathedral website and for those visiting the Chichester Nativity in December 2020. The Learning team has started work with the Diocesan Board of Education on developing school pilgrimages in the coming year, initiated a new partnership with The Children's Society, as well as renewing the Cathedral's offer to schools and the development of self-guided tours for families and schools.

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While the year has presented us with many challenges to the pattern and resourcing of educational engagement that has been practiced for several decades, it has also brought about new partnerships and possibilities that give us hope that, while the process of rebuilding may be lengthy, it will bear fruit for the Kingdom.

The Cathedral welcomed 59,835 visitors between April 2020 and March 2021, much reduced numbers affected by two national lockdowns and reduced public movement guidelines. The Cathedral achieved the VisitEngland "We're Good To Go" mark on re-opening in July, signalling a commitment to Government and industry COVID-19 guidelines. Minister for Tourism Nigel Huddlestone enjoyed his visit to the Cathedral as it re-opened, meeting volunteers and staff as he sought to understand the real challenges for those seeking to welcome the public back. The SussexTogether Festival of the Arts was launched in the summer; with Poetry, short stories, and fine art created by the community in response to the Pandemic. An exhibition of the work took place in the Cathedral 3 November – 2 December 2020 and a virtual exhibition was created for those unable to see it in situ.

One of the year's high points was the Chichester Nativity, presented for Advent and Christmas in the Cathedral. The artwork was a major new installation which heralded the heroes of the COVID-19 pandemic from the local community and across the counties of East and West Sussex. It caught the mood of the city and diocese in late 2020 and was widely shared and enjoyed, as well as being nominated for the 2021 Museums and Heritage Awards. The Nativity was just one of the occasions for greater use of QR codes, which were introduced as part of the interpretation material to help visitors delve deeper online, as well as facilitating donations as the world went cashless.

The challenges of the pandemic led to Chapter, with the CCEL Board, deciding to close the Cathedral's shop and also, for the foreseeable future, its café. With lockdowns and long-term social distancing meaning reduced capacity and footfall for some time, the existing operating model for the Café was no longer sustainable. It was a difficult decision, one that affected loyal staff and disappointed both regular and occasional customers, but one taken with the long-term health of the Cathedral in mind.

The Cathedral's staff team experienced a uniquely challenging year, as did so many others. A total of 36 employees were made redundant, and a large-scale consultation process ensued which saw staff behave with the utmost dignity in what was undoubtedly the most trying of situations. The Cathedral made use of the Government furlough scheme and many staff were furloughed, often reluctantly but without complaint and some have continued to be furloughed or part furloughed, showing great resilience and commitment. The Cathedral has reviewed its training provision and opted for a step-change by signing up to the Charity Learning Consortium which provides a wide range of online training, access to the Church of England's Safeguarding training portal and thousands of other developmental learning opportunities for our employees and volunteers all in one place. We look forward to rolling it out during 2021.

Our volunteers felt the impact of Covid restrictions and separation from the Cathedral as deeply as any group. As lockdown bit, a 'Phone buddy' network was set up for Cathedral staff to maintain communication with all volunteers, especially with those who were isolated or needed support. The team planned a phased return for volunteers as restrictions eased, inviting volunteers to indicate whether they wished to return as soon as possible; at a later date; or to stand down. This enabled a review of how to support and manage Cathedral volunteers to make their return after lockdown as safe as possible. A new volunteer role was created in July 2020 to assist with the first phase of re-opening the Cathedral. The Private Prayer Stewards were instrumental in helping to ensure the safe flow of visitors through the Cathedral, following all government guidelines whilst also offering a warm and sensitive welcome.

For those returning to the Cathedral, training sessions took place online or, where possible, face-to-face. During the January – March 2021 lockdown, volunteer get-togethers were held via Zoom, with speakers from Cathedral partners including UKHarvest, Stonepillow, and Canine Partners. Lockdown presented an opportunity to reevaluate volunteer roles - to 'Build Back Better'. The revised 'Cathedral Welcome Team' showcases the skills and

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professionalism of our visitor facing volunteers, and a commitment to operating as one team – volunteers and staff – with a common standard of excellence in providing a positive and sensitive welcome to all visitors.

The Cathedral's responsibilities in managing its estate did not cease during the pandemic, and the Estates Team barely drew breath during the lockdowns. The management of the Cathedral's residential property continued in support of tenants, and the team worked with reduced verging teams to look after the Cathedral building too. The conversion of the Treasury Building – once offices and classrooms – into suites continued once the first lockdown had lifted, delivering four beautifully converted self-catering suites by the end of the year. The securing of Cultural Recovery Fund support also made Chapter's ambitions to provide high-quality toilet facilities in the main Cathedral building a reality, with the project – also supported by the Cathedral Friends and Restoration and Development Trust – beginning in November 2020 and targeting completion in summer 2021. The conversion of this flat-roofed area off the North Transept – once an electricity substation - is an innovative piece of design and will provide much improved facilities for worshippers, visitors and event attendees.

Opposite, across the Transept, is the new entrance to the relocated Cathedral Shop, another project commenced during the year.

The pandemic threw the challenges of managing the Cathedral's commercial and residential property – and that of St Mary's Hospital - into sharp relief. In late 2020 Chapter decided to work with specialist partners – Henry Adams and Flude Commercial - to manage its property in future, rather than seeking to do so itself. The resulting restructuring sadly saw the departure of two very long-serving staff members, Nicola Smith (who has since joined the team at Henry Adams) and Debbie Atlee. Chapter wishes them every success in their future careers.

The Cathedral's communications responded strongly to the particular challenges posed by the pandemic. Weekly e-newsletters were key to keeping so many people in touch with Cathedral news throughout the year, including congregations, volunteers, and even furloughed staff. The year saw a necessary pivot towards greater digital communication, using a range of channels to reach the community during lockdown. There was innovation, in the form of virtual pilgrimages and exhibitions etc. and support for the Cathedral's burgeoning online teaching led by the Chancellor. As has already been noted, service streaming helped to develop a new online congregation, and the Cathedral team became increasingly adept at video production. Digital communications also became an important operational tool, helping staff and volunteers to stay in touch as a team.

SAFEGUARDING

Chapter is committed to the protection of children and adults at risk of harm who are visiting the cathedral, the cathedral choristers and those attending services, as well as any employees, trainees and volunteers.

In accordance with the House of Bishops Policy documents the Cathedral has a written Safeguarding Policy and Guidelines – the policy is available in the Cathedral and on its website and it is updated on multiple occasions each year, to ensure it remains relevant. The ongoing Service Level Agreement with the Diocesan Safeguarding Team, with a member of its team also being the Cathedral's Safeguarding Officer, has continued to be a successful and highly valued model. There was further change during this year as Mrs Barbara Storer returned to the NHS and the Diocesan Safeguarding Advisor Colin Perkins brought his deep experience and insight to the Cathedral as its Safeguarding Officer. He was a regular presence at the Cathedral during the latter part of this period.

The Cathedral's Safeguarding Group, including its Safeguarding Officer, met regularly by Zoom during the year to consider safeguarding issues and the continuous improvement of the Cathedral's provision. Chapter is particularly grateful to Mrs Ruth Taunt, the independent member of the committee. The special circumstances brought by the pandemic meant fewer potential issues within the Cathedral during the lockdown period, but raised the issue of digital safeguarding, which challenged the Cathedral team to think of different ways of keeping people safe.

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CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL RESTORATION AND DEVELOPMENT TRUST

Chichester Cathedral Restoration and Development Trust was formed in 1980 and since then has raised money for the restoration and development of Chichester Cathedral, other buildings within its precincts, its music foundation, its learning and engagement offering, and such other charitable objects and activities undertaken by the Chapter.

The Covid 19 Pandemic was a turning point for the Trust and the financial year 2020-2021 was spent largely on raising funds for the Cathedral to help with the very significant drop in income caused by the pandemic.

During the last financial year, the Trust's fundraisers have worked very closely with the Cathedral team to provide invaluable integrated fundraising support - and funding - for the following bids and projects:

- Historic England awarded a grant of £149,548 from the government's Cultural Recovery Fund Major Works Scheme, towards the preparation work for new facilities off the North Transept.
- Church Commissioners' Cathedrals Sustainability Fund, £247,469 award for revenue costs and in support of the implementation of the new Cathedrals Measure.
- National Lottery Heritage Fund Cultural Recovery Fund awarded £297,000 to help heritage organisations that are at risk due to no longer trading during pandemic.
- National Lottery Heritage Fund Round 2 Cultural Recovery Fund awarded £148,500 to support heritage organisations reopen post pandemic (payable 2021/22).
- Cathedral Choirs Emergency Fund made separate awards of £18,000 and £35,000 to support the Cathedral's music provision.
- Cathedral Music Fund- Revenue Fund awarded £16,000 for music.
- All Churches Trust Hope Beyond awarded £5,100 for a pilot project that addresses loneliness and digital isolation.
- The Tanner Trust award £4,500 towards a project to address Digital Isolation.
- Chichester Cathedral Millennium Endowment Trust grant of £255,000: £130,000 towards the Treasury project and £125,000 towards the Buttress 60 cloakroom refurbishment project
- £25,000 from AllChurches Trust paid annually.
- A grant towards the maintenance of the Organ

The Trust team has also played a pivotal role in the development and use of a new Cathedral-wide database, a project that brings together information about the Cathedral' supporters in one place.

The Trust is re-commencing a programme of fundraising to fund the final phase of the major project to restore and recover the Cathedral's nave roof. Work continues to develop an American Patrons programme with specialist day tours autumn 2021 and a Sussex tour in 2022. Its Design and Management Team are developing plans with the support of the wider Cathedral team to bring a spectacular Festival of Flowers in June 2022 celebrating Life in all its Fullness'.

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FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR END MARCH 2021

Covid-19 Statement

The financial year ending March 2021 for Chapter, and its wholly owned trading subsidiary Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd (CCEL), was profoundly affected by Covid-19, as a result of rolling lockdowns and other national restrictions. Operational closures, both temporary and permanent, bought organisational disruption and created significant financial deficits which were only mitigated by the support of government schemes and other grant giving bodies. Without this major external support and the continued support of its regular donors, the Cathedral would have been facing a significant financial issue this current year and on into 2022. The total Covid-related support from external bodies during the year was just in excess of £1 million.

As previously reported, Chapter started to see a significant decrease in congregations, tourism, tours, visits and events during the last quarter of the 2019/20 financial year and commercial tenants started to withhold payments on a unilateral basis as high street footfall evaporated and retail revenues collapsed. All of these areas continued to be affected during the year ending March 2021, and on again into this current financial year. In particular commercial tenancy income was heavily impacted for the majority of the financial year 2020/21 and beyond. Chapter and its agents have been discussing leases with tenants and - where applicable - additional debt provisions beyond those made in the year ending March 2020 have been made in the year ending March 2021 to adjust for the outcomes of adjusted leases. Going forward Chapter, in common with most commercial landlords, now has to plan for a future with lower yields from commercial property. A resulting downward trend on the value of our commercial properties has been accounted for in the financial results for the year end March 2021. Pressure on the Cathedral's income streams for future years is a major strategic financial issue facing Chapter.

In CCEL all aspects of operations began to experience the effect of Covid-19 from February 2020 and as reported in the previous year's Report and Accounts the Board of CCEL and Chapter took the difficult decision to close of the café and events business for the foreseeable future, with a medium-term closure of the shop. Following a full consultation, the majority of staff formally left in October 2020 – we thank them and wish them the very best for the future. Full provision for post year-end decisions and known restructuring costs were taken within the financial year to March 2020 so there is little visible impact from these closures in the financial statements to March 2021. The refurbishment of the Treasury building into suites was completed – guest accommodation will be a mainstay of Chapter's future income.

Operational staffing is now almost back to full strength – albeit not at pre-pandemic levels - and the ability to use the furlough scheme has all but ended. However, normal income levels have not yet followed the reopening, as visitors, event bookings and other income streams still lag well behind pre-Covid levels. It is worth noting that, subsequent to the March 2021 year end, the Cathedral has received further significant grants and donations from various funders to support aspects of its activity such as music, estate maintenance and communications to ensure that core skills are covered during a period where cost is required but income is still low.

The Cathedral will rely heavily on donations – including from visitors, grants and congregational giving in future years and Chapter would like to record its gratitude to all who gave so generously during 2020/21. It would also like to record its thanks for the highly professional support of the Restoration and Development Trust fundraising team during the year, including their work with the Chapter team to submit important grant applications. This collegiate approach to securing funding support has been key to the mitigation of Covid impacts over the last 18 months.

FINANCIAL REVIEW OF THE CATHEDRAL'S ACTIVITIES

Introduction

The financial statements for the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 and the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals, as specified by the Church Commissioners under section 27 of the Cathedral Measures 1999. The regulations were updated in December 2018 following the adoption of FRS 102.

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of Chapter and its wholly owned subsidiary company, Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

As stated in the notes to the financial statements there are a number of entities that are related to the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral but are not deemed to be under the control of Chapter and therefore are not consolidated within these financial statements.

Overview of the Financial Activities

Total Income from all activities amounted to £ 3,014,587 (2019/20 £3,887,857)

A marked downturn in income was driven by year-by-year phasing on the donations for the roof refurbishment and the closure of the café, events, donations, and the reduction in commercial rents, this was offset by significant grant support from government (central and local) and other grant giving bodies. Chapter has been very fortunate to receive these grants during the year and some of these are detailed below, along with other major donations. The Cathedral is extremely grateful for all the donations it receives including many from people who contribute regularly.

Total expenditure before gains and losses amounted to £3,320,627 (2019/20 £4,456,280).

The reduction in cost over the last year was largely driven by a reduction in cost of sales following the closure of trading activities (and indeed the pausing of many activities during the year) and the absence of major roof repair work which would previously have been seen in restricted funds. Nevertheless, the restricted Choral Foundation Fund was essential to support the Cathedral's continued financial commitment to its Choral Tradition during the year.

Chapter closely manages its operating budget within its Unrestricted Funds and, with its senior management team, has worked hard to reduce an operating deficit in recent years, however the effect of Covid-19 meant that in this year the consolidated result for Chapter was a deficit of $\mathcal{L}(306,040)$ before gains or losses on investments and properties.

The Cathedral undertook revaluations of some of its investment property portfolio during the year as a result of refurbishments it carried out and made an impairment on its commercial properties due to likely lower future lease yields and voids.

Overall property and investment gains/losses (realised and unrealised) amounted to a contributing loss of $\mathcal{L}(2,220,936)$. This mainly reflected a dramatic fall in the valuation of the Cathedral's commercial property, offset by equity valuations having bounced back during the year from their low point at the end of March 2020.

In summary (and including gains and losses on investments), there was a significant deficit arising from all activities amounting to $\mathcal{L}(2,591,566)$ This arose mainly as a result of operational losses driven by Covid-19 and the accounting book losses on property investments at the year end.

This surplus/ (deficit) may be analysed as follows:

Unrestricted Funds \pounds (2,923,193) Restricted Funds \pounds 451,266 Endowment Funds \pounds (119,629)

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited made a loss for the year of £(134,641) which was consolidated into the Unrestricted fund.

The Cathedral continues to make deficit contributions to the Churchworkers Pension Fund, as part of a repayment plan agreed in 2018 which spreads the repayments over a number of years to minimise the impact on cashflow.

As at 31 March 2021 the funds held by Chapter may be summarised as follows:

This compares with total funds at 31 March 2020 amounting to £40,595,982

Chapter's funds are predominantly in its property portfolio and, to a lesser degree, investments and cash.

Financial Forecast

As mentioned previously, Covid-19 will continue to have financial knock-on effects for the Cathedral for some years to come.

Chapter's investment portfolios have been - and will continue to be - utilised to cover cashflow requirements. As a result, investment income will inevitably reduce. In addition, events, commercial and visitor income will remain subdued as vaccine rollout and renewed waves of infection continue throughout 2021. The cost base is expected to remain fixed and indeed will only rise over the coming years as inflationary pressure come to bear on costs, wages and discretionary giving. Chapter continues to remain vigilant to the ongoing ripple effects from the pandemic.

As part of the recovery program, Chapter will continue to work closely with the Restoration and Development Trust and will collaborate on the overall approach to fundraising, across the whole spectrum of the Cathedral's activities, to ensure that as many potential supporters, funders and grant giving bodies are approached as is reasonably practicable.

Risk Assessment

Risk Identification, Assessment and Mitigation are integral parts of the Chapter's management task and are continuously reviewed. Since a large proportion of its unrestricted income comes from commercial rents the most obvious risk is from a continued economic downturn placing pressure on the retail sector with a further

reduction in rental income and long-term yields. For this reason, Chapter has been seeking to increase revenue from other sources and to that end has repurposed some of its property towards holiday accommodation. In addition, Chapter continues to look at any and all underutilised buildings and property in order to seek income. However, the spectre of inflation looms and if it proves to be more than a temporary blip then Chapter will face further pressure. As a result, active planning and monitoring of macro-economic trajectory becomes as important as the more local risks that Chapter manages.

Reserves Policy

It is Chapter's policy that free unrestricted funds should be readily available as a reserve sufficient to provide Chichester Cathedral with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its charitable objectives for the foreseeable future. Free Unrestricted Reserves are defined as being consolidated unrestricted funds, less unrestricted fixed physical assets.

It is hoped, that by maintaining a reasonable level of Free Unrestricted Reserves the Cathedral is protected against unforeseen loss of income from giving, grants or other sources and has a buffer against unplanned exceptional financial expenditure.

Chapter's Free Unrestricted Reserves should be maintained at a level which is at least equivalent to three months' expenditure.

Free reserves carried forward at 31 March 2021 amount to £1,128,775 compared with an estimate of three months expenditure amounting to approximately £400,000 (excluding Enterprises which is trading related).

Chapter reviews the amount of reserves that it requires on an annual basis to ensure that they are adequate to fulfil the Cathedral's continuing obligations.

Investment & Cash Policy

Under the Cathedrals Measure 1999 Chapter may invest the Cathedral's funds in any of the following:

- Land.
- Funds administered for the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England by CCLA Investment Management Limited.
- Investments in which the Trustees may invest under the general power of investment in the Trustee Act 2000.
- The improvement or development of property belonging to the Cathedral, except that endowment funds may not be used to improve or develop the Cathedral itself and its ancillary buildings.

Chapter seeks the maximum yield to be prudently achieved from a mixture of bonds and equities, predominantly equities, in order to deliver the mission of the Cathedral. Over a period of years, the income and capital values should grow fast enough to counteract the effects of the rise in RPI.

Chapter, on the advice of the Finance Committee, and following a full tendering exercise, has taken the decision to divest all its M&G Charifund / Charibond units and move them to CCLA (Churches, Charities and Local Authorities) Investment Management Limited investment funds which will shift the balance of investments to 100% in equities, managed entirely by CCLA.

CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ENTERPRISES LIMITED

Chapter solely owns Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd (CCEL) which undertakes the commercial activities of the Cathedral at properties and venues located within the Cathedral precinct.

Following the implementation of lockdown measures by the Government in March 2020 in response to the Covid-19 pandemic all activities in which the company engages were stopped, which had an immediate impact on the financial position of the company continued throughout 2020 and 2021.

Following the strategic review of the company's operations in the early part of the financial year the decision was made to close the Cafe and events located within the cloisters of Chichester Cathedral. All costs associated with the closure of the café, shop and events business were provided for in the previous financial year to March 2020. These included redundancy costs, stock provisions and fixed asset write downs.

The other activities of the company were opened and closed - in part or in whole - as lockdown measures were relaxed or strengthened during the course of the year. In the last quarter of the year CCEL started to rent out newly refurbished guest accommodation in the Treasury building in addition to its existing portfolio of staying rooms and holiday lets. The Directors continued to take advantage of the Government support schemes as they applied to the company throughout the year.

Going forward, CCEL is a much lower-cost and lower-risk operation than before, focusing solely on accommodation nights, event space hire, and a reduced volunteer-led shop provision within the Cathedral building. It has established partnerships to provide catering direct to event clients whilst CCEL charges solely for the hire of the wonderful spaces that can be found around our precincts. The board of CCEL is confident that the revised business with its simpler management requirements will grow in a carefully controlled manner as the world emerges from the pandemic. Chapter continues to support CCEL financially and a formalised loan facility has recently been implemented to allow CCEL the headroom to re-establish its trading income levels in this new business model.

Overall result for the year end March 2021

Overall CCEL made a loss of $\mathcal{L}(134,641)$ for the year to 31 March 2021 which compares to a loss of $\mathcal{L}(63,887)$ in the previous year, being a negative swing of over $\mathcal{L}(70,000)$ due almost entirely to the effects of Covid-19.

THE CHAPTER OF CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2021

BASIS OF PREPARATION

The Cathedral constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals issued in December 2018 by the Cathedral Administration and Finance Association, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

GOING CONCERN

Chapter consider that there is a reasonable expectation that the Cathedral has and will continue to have adequate resources to operate for the foreseeable future.

The Covid-19 pandemic has had a material impact on the Cathedral both in terms of its ability to operate and the level of income generated from all sources. Action taken to mitigate the impact of the pandemic is detailed in the Covid-19 statement on page 12 of the annual report.

Given the actions taken and the production of forecasts that show adequate resources are available to contend with any further prolonged lockdown the accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of the Chapter and of its wholly owned subsidiary company Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

INCOME

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the Cathedral is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations, legacies and grants to be recognised the Cathedral will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the income and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained, then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfillment of those conditions is within the control of the Cathedral and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

THE CATHEDRAL, ITS ANCILLARY BUILDINGS AND THE INVENTORY

In accordance with the Guidelines on English Anglican Cathedral Accounts, no value is attributed in the balance sheet to the Cathedral and its ancillary buildings as it is an inalienable and historic building for which no reliable cost information or conventional valuation basis is available.

No value is attributed to items included in the Cathedral inventory which comprises items of architectural, archaeological, artistic or historic interest.

THE CHAPTER OF CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2021

EQUIPMENT AND PLANT

Chapter:-

In accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulation for English Anglican Cathedrals plant, machinery, office equipment, furniture and fittings and computer equipment are written off on acquisition.

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited:-

Assets with an initial cost price which exceeds £500 are capitalised and depreciation is provided to write down the cost of all tangible fixed assets by equal annual instalments over their expected useful economic lives. The rates generally applicable are:-

Furniture and equipment Fittings in premises Computer equipment 10% and 20% on cost

10% on cost 25% on cost

INVESTMENT PROPERTY

Investment properties are initially measured at cost and subsequently are included at fair value of the freehold and lease investments.

The non-investment properties are included at a nominal value.

LISTED INVESTMENTS

Investments are included in the financial statements as follows:

- (a) Investments are shown at their fair value on 31st March 2021.
- (b) Realised gains and losses are calculated as the difference between their market value on the date of disposal and their market value on the previous balance sheet date.

STOCKS

Shop and refectory stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

VALUE ADDED TAX

A group registration for the Chapter and Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd is in operation. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of the items reported in the financial statements.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO PENSION SCHEMES

The pension costs charged to the accounts represent the amount of the contributions paid to both the Defined Benefit and Pension Builders Schemes in respect of the accounting period.

FUNDS

The financial statements include the following funds:-

- (a) Endowment funds those where there is no power to spend the capital
- (b) Restricted funds those where there are specific conditions attached to the expenditure of either capital or income or both
- (c) Unrestricted funds those where both capital and income may be spent at the discretion of the Chapter.

15 Pensions

Clergy pensions are the liability of the Church Commissioners who pay contributions to the Church of England Funded Pensions Scheme.

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral participates in the Church of England Defined Benefits Scheme (DBS), part of the Church Workers Pensions Fund, for employees who joined the staff before 31st December 2002 and the Church of England Contribution Scheme (DCS). At 31st March 2019 the Chapter had no active members and 9 deferred pension members in the Fund. The assets of the fund are held separately from those of the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral.

The Defined Benefits scheme was the subject of a full actuarial valuation as at 31 December 2019. The fund as it related to the Chapter was shown to be in deficit. The total deficit was assessed to be £135,900. Chapter has entered into a revised payment arrangement to eliminate the deficit arising. Annual payments of £17,649 will be made to 31 March 2021 at which point they will increase to £19,465 per annum until 1 April 2028.

Full provision has been made in these financial statements for the deficit as noted above.

In addition contribution rates have increased from 1 April 2015 to a total of 37.9% (employers 24.7% and employees 13.2%).

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral also participates in a stakeholder defined contribution scheme. Contributions to this scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise.

16 Expenses of members of the Chapter

During the year 2 members (2020: 4) of Chapter had expenses reimbursed by the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral. The amount reimbursed was £1,926 (2020 £9,591).

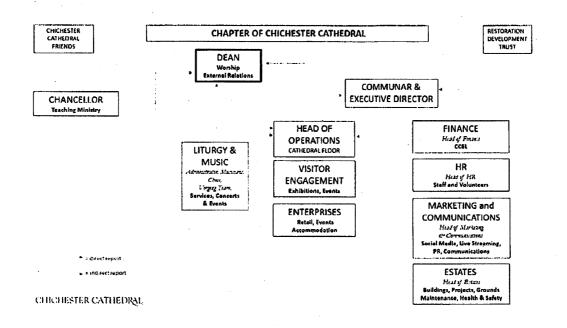
