STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT (GOVERNANCE)

CONSTITUTION AND STATUTES

The Cathedral is governed by the Cathedrals Measure 1999 and its resulting Constitution and Statutes that came into effect in September 2000. The Constitution and Statutes require that any person or body having functions under these instruments shall have due regard to the fact that the Cathedral is the seat of the Bishop of Chichester and a centre of worship and mission.

A new Cathedrals Measure was enacted in 2021 and the coming year will see governance changes as its provisions are implemented, including registration of the Cathedral with the Charity Commission which is due to be completed in June 2023.

The authorities in this section each have a specific role in the governance of the Cathedral.

THE CHAPTER OF THE CATHEDRAL

Under the Constitution of the Cathedral, the Chapter shall consist of the Dean (Chair) and all Residentiary Canons of the Cathedral; one member of the College of Canons elected by the College; between two and six other persons appointed jointly by the Bishop and the Chapter; and the Communar.

The Chapter is the equivalent to a charity's trustee board and Lay Chapter Members are effectively non-executive trustees. It's a key role which requires vision, an aptitude for governance and a commitment to the Cathedral's flourishing.

In September 2021 year the Bishop of Chichester appointed two new Canons, a new Treasurer, Revd Dr Vanessa Baron, and Precentor, Revd Dr Jack Dunn. The Chapter continues to seek additional new lay members. The College of Canons elected Venerable Angela Martin, Archdeacon of Horsham and Vicar of Forest Row, to join the Chapter and she formally joined in January 2022. Simon Bell resigned his membership as a Chapter member effective the end of March 2022.

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of the Chapter to direct and oversee the administration of the affairs of the Cathedral having regard to the views of the Bishop, the College of Canons and the Cathedral Council and in particular to:

- Order the worship and promote the mission of the Cathedral.
- Formulate, after consultation with the Bishop, proposals in connection with the general direction and mission of the Cathedral and submit them to the Council for its advice.
- Prepare an annual budget for the Cathedral.
- Submit to the Council the annual report and audited accounts prepared by the Chapter and such other reports as may be requested by the Council on any matter concerning the Cathedral.
- Submit to the College of Canons the annual report and audited accounts prepared as aforesaid.
- Keep under review the Constitution and Statutes of the Cathedral.
- Manage all property vested in the Cathedral and the income accruing from it and, in particular, ensure that the necessary repairs and maintenance in respect of the Cathedral and its contents and other buildings and monuments are carried out.
- Perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

The Chapter is also responsible under the requirements laid down by the Church Commissioners under the powers given them by Section 27 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999 for:

- Preparing and publishing an annual report and audited accounts which give a true and fair view
 of the financial activities for each financial year and of the assets, liabilities and funds at the end
 of each financial year of Chichester Cathedral and its connected entities.
- Stating that they have complied in all material respects with the guidelines on the subject prepared by the Association of English Cathedrals or describing which recommendations have not been complied with and giving reasons for non-compliance.
- Selecting suitable accounting policies and then applying them consistently.
- Making judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- Keeping proper accounting records, from which the financial position of the Cathedral can be ascertained with reasonable accuracy at any time.
- Safeguarding the assets of the Cathedral and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Cathedral is a Public Benefit entity and in setting the aims of the Cathedral the Chapter has paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on Public Benefit.

New members of the Chapter undergo a thorough induction to brief them on their obligations, including briefings from the Cathedral's specialist staff and specific information about the Cathedral Constitution and Statutes and the Cathedrals Measure 1999. The Cathedral's structure, decision-making processes and the financial performance of the Cathedral are also addressed. Members of the Chapter are encouraged to attend appropriate training events, especially those provided throughout the year by the Association of English Cathedrals, including safeguarding.

Senior staff remuneration is reviewed annually, and increases are considered by the Chapter in the context of average wage inflation in the charitable sector and the wider economy. When reviewing senior roles the Chapter benchmarks pay levels against similar roles in other Cathedrals of a similar size, in other comparable charitable organisations and in the wider region. Clergy stipend levels are set nationally by the Church Commissioners.

THE BISHOP

The Cathedral is the Mother Church of the Diocese and values its central role in the Diocese's worshipping life and its close relationship with the Bishop of Chichester and his team. The principal seat of the Bishop is in the Cathedral and the Bishop presides regularly at services including ordinations. The Bishop was a regular visitor to the Cathedral during the year and the Cathedral and Diocesan teams worked closely together to share major services from the Cathedral with a digital audience through the Diocese.

THE CATHEDRAL COUNCIL

The Cathedrals Measure 1999 requires that it shall be the duty of the Council to further and support the work of the Cathedral, spiritual, pastoral, evangelistic and ecumenical, reviewing and advising upon the direction and oversight of that work by the Chapter.

The Bishop, as Visitor, is invited to attend as an advisor and non-voting member.

The Council is therefore both an advisory and consultative body and it has been meeting twice a year since its inauguration in January 2001. During the period of this report the Council has met to be briefed and to discuss a range of topics, including:

- New Cathedral toilet facilities
- The Dominican Pillars strategic planning to 2025
- Cathedrals Measure 2021
- Cathedral Safeguarding Audit (SCIE)
- · Financial briefing including
 - o Management accounts
 - o 2022/23 budget
- · Updates on topics such as:
 - o The Prebendal School
 - o Worship
 - o Music
 - Café tender process
- Appraising the Chapter's annual report and commenting on the wide range of Cathedral activities contained therein
- Receiving briefs from the chairs of the various Cathedral committees.

The members of the Cathedral Council are listed at Appendix 4.

THE COLLEGE OF CANONS

The College of Canons is formed from the Dean, Residentiary Canons, Lay Members of the Chapter, the Bishops Suffragan, the Archdeacons, thirty-one Prebendary Canons and up to five Lay Canons (none of which have been appointed to date). Two members are elected to the Cathedral Council. One member is elected to the Chapter. The Communar acts as Secretary.

The College of Canons shall:

- Meet annually on a day as near as convenient to the Feast of All Saints, whenever the Bishop
 desires to seek its counsel or advice on any matter, whenever it is required to make an election
 or, if a request for a meeting were made by not less than two-thirds of its members.
- · Receive and consider the annual report and audited accounts.
- Discuss such matters concerning the Cathedral as may be raised by any of its members.
- Perform such functions as may be prescribed.

A list of members of the College of Canons is at Appendix 5.

A meeting of the College took place on 17 November 2021, which was well attended, and members appreciated the time to share the experience of worshipping and engaging with the cathedral community.

FABRIC ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Under the Care of Cathedrals Measure 1990 (as amended in 2008 and 2011), the Fabric Advisory Committee (FAC) is responsible to the Cathedrals Fabric Commission for England (CFCE) and considers applications from the Chapter in regard to proposed development of and changes to the Cathedral's fabric. It also advises the Chapter on the care, conservation, repair and development of the Cathedral and meets three times a year.

The ten members of this committee serve for a period of five years and may be re-appointed. The members appoint a Chair from among their own number. The Communar is the FAC Secretary. The Dean, Surveyor of the Fabric, Consultant Archaeologist and Head of Estates attend meetings of the Committee and are entitled to speak but not to vote. Other Chapter members are free to attend if they wish.

At the date of this report, the committee was at full strength.

Over the course of the year the committee considered the development and progress of the following key projects:

- Cathedral lighting project
- · Live streaming system
- · North Transept toilets
- Cathedral font: lowering of the plinth
- Romanesque reliefs: ongoing monitoring to consider whether and when to remove the cover from the second relief
- Cathedral inventory: ongoing updates
- Cathedral roof
- Various Cathedral access issues
- Bell Tower conservation
- Piper Tapestry conservation

FINANCE AUDIT AND RISK COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee meets four times a year.

The Committee consists of a Chair, Chapter members and up to four other external members appointed by the Chapter for their expertise and experience in the field of finance and investment management. The Chapter members are the Dean, Precentor, and the Communar with the Head of Finance as an attendee.

The Members of the Committee are listed at Appendix 8.

CATHEDRAL COMMUNITY ROLL

Membership of the Cathedral Roll is open to anyone aged sixteen or over who worships regularly at the Cathedral, is resident in the Close or holds office linked to the Cathedral. There is an annual meeting of those on the Cathedral Roll, chaired by the Dean, at which elections take place to the Cathedral Council, the Cathedral Community Committee and the Chichester Deanery Synod. The annual general meeting took place on 10 May 2022.

CATHEDRAL COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

The Cathedral Community Committee is expected to meet at least four times a year to advise the Chapter on all matters affecting the Cathedral Community and to undertake such functions as may be delegated to it by the Chapter. However, during the pandemic the Community Committee has not met. The Chapter will consider the best future routes to generating engagement from congregation, staff and volunteers in the light of the new Cathedrals Measure.

CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL RESTORATION AND DEVELOPMENT TRUST

Chichester Cathedral Restoration and Development Trust (the Trust) was formed in 1980 and since then has raised money for the restoration and development of Chichester Cathedral, other buildings within its precincts, its music foundation, its learning, and engagement offering, and such other charitable objects and activities undertaken by the Chapter.

The Trust does not form part of the consolidated accounts for Chichester Cathedral as it is a separate legal entity, however it is an important part of our Cathedral family, and the Chapter is grateful for its support during the past financial year.

During the year to 31 March 2022, the Trust provided fundraising support and funding for the following:

- Raised £253,216 for the restoration and re-covering of the nave roof
- A grant of £49,000 for the restoration of 4 Vicars Close
- A grant of £15,000 for works to 1 St Faiths
- Cathedral Sustainability Fund, the Cathedral was awarded £143,209 for revenue costs associated with the visitor donations initiative
- Cultural Recovery Fund for Heritage Round 2, the Cathedral was awarded £148,500
- All Churches Trust awarded a grant of £25,000
- Cathedral Music Trust awarded £16,000 towards revenue costs
- Traditional Cathedral Choir Association awarded £5,000 towards revenue costs
- Organised a team to enter Ride & Stride in support of Sussex Historic Churches
- A grant of £15,000 towards the liturgical art project

Accumulated income from Chichester Cathedral Millennium Endowment Trust is earmarked to support the Nave Roof project when it recommences.

Working within the bounds of social-distancing, the Trust has re-activated a programme of supporter engagement events including a Thanksgiving Evensong, an In Conversation with Hugh Bonneville, a wreath-making workshop with celebrity florist Paul Hawkins and a Garden Talk, as well as inviting supporters to special preview events organised by the Cathedral including *Museum of the Moon* and *Field of Blooms*. A major event, Festival of Flowers, postponed since 2020 took place in June 2022.

The Trust has established an Advisory Council, drawing on emeritus trustees and patrons to support its networking and fundraising.

The Trust has been a part of a joint initiative including the Cathedral Friends and the Chapter to create a single contact database for the three entities. This project made huge strides during the year in report and is now firmly in use, including the implementation of a Joint Data Sharing Agreement.

Finally, the Trust is also developing funding for a low energy lighting project and scoping a music endowment trust, both initiatives will be launched later in 2022. The Trustees are listed at Appendix 9.

THE CATHEDRAL'S ACTIVITIES DURING THE YEAR

Despite continued COVID restrictions and the emergence of the Omicron variant, with the assistance of a great Cathedral staff team, volunteers and members of the congregation and community we were able to host a few successful events.

The Cathedral displayed a temporary floral installation, remembering those impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, the lives lost and those affected in the city, Diocese, and nation. Volunteer flower arrangers created a beautiful calla-lily installation in the Cathedral's Mary Magdalene Chapel in the south-eastern corner. The structure mirrored the staircase in Graham Sutherland's painting *Noli me Tangere*, which is located on the altar of this contemplative space. Chief Nurse Dr Maggie Davies from the University Hospitals Sussex NHS Foundation Trust joined the Cathedral team to lay the final flower in the installation

Art at the Cathedral

The Cathedral continued its long-standing tradition of showcasing the work of artists, and celebrated the work of two creative projects, both displayed in the Cathedral's North Transept.

- Tears of Joy was an exhibition of artworks created by young asylum seekers and refugees from across the Chichester District, presented from 14th – 21st June to mark Refugee Week 2021. Developed by Article 12 Arts in collaboration with Sanctuary in Chichester, the exhibition aimed to provide the young artists with an opportunity to creatively express themselves, develop artistic skills and to voice their experiences. The artworks also helped to draw attention to the plight of these young refugees, providing insight into what brings each of them joy.
- <u>Darkness Into Light</u> was an exhibition of multi-layered, meditative artworks by Artist Michèle Griffiths
 which was on display from 23rd June 2021. The collection explored the possibility of hope in dark
 times: the triumph of light over darkness. The pieces, which Griffiths calls "wall fragments", are in
 plaster and are highly textured with marks scored into the surface to replicate the aged graffiti that
 can be seen in the ancient walls of the Cathedral.
- Museum of the Moon by Luke Jerram saw 50,000 people visit the Cathedral between 25th October and 14th November 2021. The installation was a fusion of lunar imagery, moonlight and surround sound composition created by BAFTA and Ivor Novello award winning composer Dan Jones. It had previously been on display in such diverse places as the Natural History Museum and Glastonbury Festival. The artwork was on display within the Nave over a three week period and was accompanied by a diverse programme of events and activities.
- The Art of Worship residency between January and March 2022 saw the next steps in Chichester Cathedral's long history of seeking the face of God in visual form. Leading British liturgical artists Martin Earle and James Blackstone were based within a custom-built studio in the Cathedral's North Transept. The project was developed with celebrated liturgical artist Aidan Hart. Visitors to the Cathedral were invited to observe timeless, intricate mosaic techniques in the setting of a busy working studio.
- Field of Blooms was presented as part of the Advent and Christmas celebrations, from 29th November 2021 to 30th January 2022. The installation, from British artist Bruce Munro and curated by Visual Arts Advisor Jacquiline Creswell, was presented within 'Paradise', within the Cathedral's 600 year old Cloisters. The hundreds of gently illuminated spheres of light gradually changed and morphed in colour.

Worship & Liturgy

To overcome the challenge of engaging a congregation during Covid-19 restrictions the Cathedral continued to use live streaming of services. The Cathedral secured a grant from the Culture Recovery Fund for Heritage and the Heritage Stimulus Fund - funded by Government and administered by Historic England and the National Lottery Heritage Fund, part of which was dedicated to improving our digital infrastructure. As a result, a new streaming system was installed, working with AV specialists Church Stream. This system enabled us to deliver higher quality broadcasts from a range of locations within the Cathedral. In future we will also be exploring the streaming of other events and activity.

We were able to return to hosting major Diocesan occasions - the Ordination of eight new Deacons, the Licensing of six Lay Readers, the Commissioning of 60 Authorised Lay Ministers, and the Installation of 39 lay people into the Order of St Richard, recognising their service to their communities.

Following the disruption of the Omicron variant, which heavily affected attendance at services over Christmas, the Cathedral returned to un-distanced seating for services and concerts in early 2022. Sunday morning worship reverted to its pre-pandemic pattern with the return of Choral Mattins, and a single offering of the Eucharist without the requirement to book places in advance. An additional new dedicated service for children, families and caregivers has also met with great approval.

On 6th March 2022 the Cathedral welcomed the Archbishop of Canterbury to Choral Evensong, as the conclusion of his three-day visit to the Diocese. The service and reception afterwards was an opportunity for the Archbishop to engage with the people of our diocese, many of whom were not regular worshippers.

Outreach and Ministry to Children Young Families and Caregivers

The Canon Precentor has strategic oversight of: congregational growth and development; communications; children and young people, their families and caregivers; youth ministry; learning and engagement with schools. Within the Diocese, he has helped to design and deliver the 'Great Is Thy Faithfulness' Pilot Church Growth programme working with 16 parishes and benefices across the Diocese of Chichester and supported a number of parishes and benefices across Chichester Diocese as a Parish Development Officer; and supported the shared work of discernment of the Bishop of Chichester and the Diocesesan Director of Ordinands in his capacity as a national panel selector for Ordained Vocations.

Pastoral Care

The Revd Vanessa Baron became a member of the Chapter at the end of September 2021 as full-time, house for duty, residentiary Canon Treasurer. With strategic management for the pastoral care of the Cathedral congregations the lay pastoral care team has been revived. People who ceased to come to the Cathedral as a result of the pandemic have been identified and a system of pastoral care initiated. Encouragingly, new people were willing to join the established team. To enable and encourage new members of the congregation to meet others a series of social events was arranged over the winter for people to meet together. After the long isolation of the pandemic these were welcomed. Confirmation classes with pupils from the Prebendal School were re-established.

Choral Activities

Choral activities gradually returned to normal and, despite the musical limitations, a varied repertoire of music was offered including some works from the early 15th century.

A small-scale Southern Cathedrals Festival was organised at Winchester, involving video recordings of the three cathedral choirs (Chichester, Salisbury and Winchester) and a day of 'live' services.

The choir was particularly busy during the Christmas period, performing a concert for the 'Belmond' luxury travel company, six performances at Chichester Festival Theatre (to a combined audience of about 7000) and five carol services in the Cathedral.

In December 2021, we announced that girls would be invited to join the choir to sing alongside boys in a mixed team. Although unusual in English cathedrals, this format is also to be adopted at Hereford, St George's Windsor and St John's College Cambridge.

The choir resumed its ministry around the Diocese, singing Evensong at Holy Trinity Church, Forest Row in February, despite fierce storms of the sort that occasioned the postponement of a visit to the same church two years earlier!

A series of pre-recorded performance were offered in place of the familiar lunchtime recitals, at a time when large audiences were discouraged from assembling: each of the videos was enjoyed by audiences of several hundred. The recitals returned to their usual Tuesday slot in January 2022 and continue to enjoy the considerable support of a large and loyal following.

In addition to the return of our own Lunchtime Concert series, we were delighted to welcome back regular performers The Sixteen and Chichester Singers and newcomers London Concertante to give the first concert performances since 2020.

Learning and Engagement

Despite limited resource, we were pleased to welcome a small selection of schools in the last academic year although demand remained very limited during successive waves of Covid in schools themselves. Alongside this we hosted family art days on the Cathedral Green in association with the Tidy Art School in Birdham and have formed a positive new association with the Chichester BookFest that is resulting in events this coming year to encourage literacy among the local population. This is coupled with a new collaboration with the Dolly Parton Imagination Library, providing books for families through Family Support Work (a charity with well-established links to the Cathedral) for children aged 0-5.

Adult education has developed further through the Cathedral Theology Network (www.cathedraltheology.org). This is an online platform that the Cathedral has developed providing free and accessible theological teaching to people, building on the online teaching offered by the Chancellor in successive lockdowns. Over 300 people have taken part in courses on the Early Church, the history and spirituality of the Church of England, the Psychology of Religion and the English Church in the Middle Ages. We seek to expand this in coming years in association with diocesan plans to develop theological and dogmatic understanding in advance of the 17th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea.

As part of the *Art of Worship* residency, Jim Blackstone gave a series of lectures on liturgical art and the spiritual senses, and there was a very successful study day at the Bishop's Palace on the principles and process of commissioning liturgical art.

Our People

Like many organisations, 2021-2022 continued to be challenging for our people.

We continued working from home and hosting meetings on Microsoft Teams where the constant cry of "you're on mute" became the norm as did the term hybrid working which is now an accepted way of working for many colleagues.

We continue to invest in our people and embedded our on-line training portal, courtesy of the Charity Learning Consortium, which provides health and safety training, access to the CofE Safeguarding training portal and thousands of other developmental learning opportunities for our employees and many

volunteers all in one place. We trained four employees as Mental Health First Aiders as part of our wellbeing strategy which is underpinned by our Employee Assistance Programme provided by Health Assured. We plan to roll out further mental health awareness training to employees and volunteers.

Students from Chichester College joined us from October 2021 on work experience. This special partnership has given 'Travel and Tourism' students the opportunity to gain valuable volunteering experience with us and the chance to contribute positively to the life of the Cathedral.

We were delighted to have new joiners: June Scott, Executive Assistant to the Communar, Chloe Webb, Digital Marketing and Communications Coordinator and Ruth Bamford, Head of Finance.

We said goodbye to our colleagues Mike Titley and Karen Jones, who left the cathedral. We deeply miss Ross Etheridge who served the Cathedral for a decade. Ross passed away in 2021 shortly after resigning his position due to ill health.

Our Volunteers

In November 2021, Carolyn Atkinson, Volunteer and HR Co-ordinator, and Ken Sim, Volunteer Project Leader, together with a dedicated team of six 'digital volunteers' were pleased to launch an initiative called 'HomeTech' to help members of the Cathedral community make the most of new technology; especially those who, up to now, had been excluded due to their lack of digital knowledge.

A survey carried out during summer 2021, helped the team to develop a programme of five free, all-inclusive workshops to help members of the Cathedral community become more tech-savvy, in subjects such as: The Basics; 'When I'm Calling You'; Making Life Easier; Leisure; Shopping. Those attending the workshops were encouraged to bring along any portable technology they had, to get direct advice on how to best use it, and thanks to the generous support of the All Churches Trust, the HomeTech team were able to purchase laptops and tablets for others to try out during the workshops.

The response to the launch was overwhelming with around seventy people signing up for all five workshops run in February 2022. As a result, the workshops were split into two groups and re-located to a bigger venue.

We thank the HomeTech team for their hard work and dedication to this project, and Ken for his superb leadership.

Our Drop-In Guided Tours have returned, led by our talented and expert group of volunteer Guides. Our tour encompasses all aspects of the Cathedral including its history, art, and architecture.

The Seffrid Guild has returned to the Cathedral and has begun work on new kneelers and some restoration work. With responsibility for the Cathedral's treasures the Canon Treasurer has started work on a more systematic approach to the maintenance and conservation of the Cathedral's treasures.

Estates

It was another challenging year as lockdowns and disruption to supplies of timber, plaster and other essential building materials hampered looking after the Cathedral estate and affected the pricing of works. Despite the challenges, the team worked closely with colleagues, contractors, and residents to ensure works progressed. Notable achievements over the period included the opening of the Treasury Apartments, a set of four high quality apartments to complement the already well used 4 Canon Lane accommodation. The Canon Lane suites also underwent a phased cycle of upgrades and improvements.

Other projects included the clearance and start of permissions to convert 1 St Faiths to holiday accommodation, site-wide tree, wall and path surveys, and working with SSE to improve power supplies to Canon Lane with an electrical sub station. Within the Cathedral itself, the creation of a newly refurbished WC suite was completed, and modifications made to the font base to remove a plinth that presented a trip hazard.

SAFEGUARDING

The Church of England has commissioned an independent audit of how cathedrals keep people safe from harm and abuse. Its purpose is to proactively enable learning and improvement in how cathedrals individually, and collectively, keep people safe. A satisfactory audit is now a prerequisite for registering with the Charity Commission under the new Cathedrals Measure 2021 Legislation. Chichester's audit took place between 14th and 16th September 2021.

Two auditors from the Social Care Institute for Excellence (SCIE) conducted the safeguarding audit onsite, examining safeguarding files, policies and training, as well as interviewing safeguarding professionals including our Diocesan and Cathedral Safeguarding Advisor, the Chair of the Bishop's Safeguarding Advisory Panel, members of the Chapter, the staff team and seeking survey feedback from members of the congregation, choristers and their parents.

The final report was published on 4th January and detailed the SCIE Auditor's findings, affirmations and their recommendations on how we can further improve our practice to make the Cathedral environment safer still.

The Chapter is committed to the protection of children and adults at risk of harm who are visiting the cathedral, of the cathedral choristers and of those attending services, as well as employees, trainees and volunteers. It has welcomed the feedback from the auditors. The observations and recommendations made by the auditors have been incorporated into a safer church action plan that will be monitored closely by the Chapter.

The Cathedral staff and volunteers have all been inducted in two crucial guidelines issued by the CofE –

- Code of safer working
- · Safer environment and activities

Senior leaders have also undertaken National Safeguarding training level 4.

The Cathedral's Safeguarding Management Team, including its Diocesan Safeguarding Officer, met regularly during the year to consider safeguarding issues and the continuous improvement of the Cathedral's provision. The Chapter is particularly grateful to Mrs Ruth Taunt, the independent member of the committee throughout the reporting period, who stepped down in 2022.

FINANCIAL REVIEW OF THE CATHEDRAL'S ACTIVITIES

Introduction

The financial statements for the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 and the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals, as specified by the Church Commissioners under section 27 of the Cathedral Measures 1999. The regulations were updated in February 2015 following the adoption of FRS 102.

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of the Chapter and its wholly owned subsidiary company, Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

As stated in the notes to the financial statements there are a number of entities that are related to the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral but are not deemed to be under the control of the Chapter, including Chichester Cathedral Restoration and Development Trust (Trust) and Chichester Cathedral Friends (Friends), and therefore are not consolidated within these financial statements.

Overview of the Financial Activities

Total Income from all activities amounted to £ 2,620,914 (2020/21 £3,014,587)

Grant income during the financial year was significantly lower than in 2020/21 due to the reduction in Government Covid support grants following the end of the furlough scheme. Despite this Chapter is very grateful to have received a number of grants, some of these are detailed below, along with other major donations.

The Cathedral is extremely grateful for all the donations it received including many from people who contribute regularly.

Total expenditure before gains and losses amounted to £2,571,888 (2020/21 £3,320,627).

The reduction in costs was a result of the reduction in cost of sales following the closure of the café, and savings made on the outsourcing of investment property management. The restricted Choral Foundation Fund continued to support the Cathedral's music.

The Chapter closely manages its operating budget within its Unrestricted Funds and, with its senior management team, has worked hard to reduce an operating deficit in recent years. This year Chapter is pleased to report a small consolidated surplus of £49,026 (2021: deficit £(306,040)) before gains or losses on investments and properties.

No new investment property valuations were carried out as at 31 March 2022 but an unrealised loss of £3,060,000 was reported in the prior year. An unrealised investment gain of £202,788 (2021: £839,064) was recorded.

In summary (and including gains and losses on investments), a small surplus arose across all activities amounting to £236,211 (2021: Deficit £(2,591,566)). The surplus is mainly attributable to successful grant applications, and the ability to draw from the Chichester Cathedral Choral Foundation for music costs.

This surplus/ (deficit) for the year to 31 March 2022 may be analysed as follows:

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited made a profit for the year of £129,360 (2021: Loss £(134,641)) which was consolidated into the Unrestricted fund.

The Cathedral continues to make deficit contributions to the Churchworkers Pension Fund, as part of a repayment plan agreed in 2018 which spreads the repayments over a number of years to minimise the impact on cashflow.

The Chapter Funds

As at 31 March 2022 the funds held by the Chapter may be summarised as follows:

This compares with total funds at 31 March 2021 amounting to £38,181,019. The Chapter's funds are predominantly in its property portfolio and, to a lesser degree, investments, and cash.

Financial Forecast

As mentioned previously, Covid-19 will continue to have financial knock-on effects for the Cathedral for some years to come. Visitor numbers are still lower than 2019 levels and commercial property rentals are at lower levels, yet Government support and many of the emergency support measures have now been withdrawn. As a result, the Chapter has approved a total budget deficit of £100,063 for the next financial year.

Following a careful tendering and selection process the Cathedral café will reopen in Autumn 2022 with a new partner. Although the first year will not generate any income the forecasts for subsequent years are promising.

The introduction of the visitors' desk has provided an immediate uplift in donations and improved engagement with visitors.

The Chapter is vigilant to the increases in the cost of living and awarded a 4% salary increase to all except the highest paid staff in April 2022. It remains committed to paying the Real Living Wage.

Risk Assessment

Risk identification, assessment and mitigation are reviewed in detail by the Finance, Audit and Risk committee and changes in risk profile are assessed by Chapter. During the year key risk areas concerning our trading subsidiary, Cathedral finances, and commercial rental income have been reduced due to strategic changes which have improved the financial performance within these areas. Only one key risk area increased during the year which was around people. The risk increased due to staff being stretched and tired as a result of Covid and due to continuing challenges around recruitment.

Reserves Policy

It is Chapter's policy that free unrestricted funds should be readily available as a reserve sufficient to provide Chichester Cathedral with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its charitable objectives for the foreseeable future. Free unrestricted reserves are defined as being consolidated unrestricted funds, less unrestricted fixed physical assets.

It is hoped, that by maintaining a reasonable level of free unrestricted reserves the Cathedral is protected against unforeseen loss of income from giving, grants or other sources and has a buffer against unplanned exceptional financial expenditure.

The Chapter's free unrestricted reserves should be maintained at a level which is at least equivalent to three months' expenditure.

Free reserves carried forward at 31 March 2022 amount to £1,223,571 (2021: £1,128,775) compared with an estimate of three months expenditure amounting to approximately £400,000 (excluding our trading subsidiary).

The Chapter reviews the amount of reserves that it requires on an annual basis to ensure that they are adequate to fulfil the Cathedral's continuing obligations.

Investment and Cash Policy

Under the Cathedrals Measure 1999 the Chapter may invest the Cathedral's funds in any of the following:

- Land
- Funds administered for the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England by CCLA Investment Management Limited
- Investments in which the Trustees may invest under the general power of investment in the Trustee Act 2000
- The improvement or development of property belonging to the Cathedral, except that endowment funds may not be used to improve or develop the Cathedral itself and its ancillary buildings

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited

Chapter solely owns Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited (CCEL) which undertakes the commercial trading activities of the Cathedral at properties and venues located within the Cathedral precinct. Under a simplified model CCEL has continued to trade well in accommodation, retail and venue hire with a considerably reduced team.

Self-catering holiday accommodation performed significantly better than anticipated in the year with Canon Gate and 2 St Faiths benefitting from high occupancy levels. In June of 2021 CCEL added four newly refurbished suites into its guestroom portfolio building on the high occupancy levels of the ever-popular 4 Canon Lane.

Supported by a team of volunteers the Cathedral shop is now open 6 days per week from 11am to 3pm in its new home in the Treasury, within the North Transept. The Directors continued to utilise Government support schemes throughout the year including a small restart grant for retail which supported the team to close down the old shop space and move into the Treasury.

Following a strategic review of the company's operations in mid-2020 the decision was made to close the Café. In late 2021 CCEL began seeking a catering partner to take on the space that was formally the Cloisters Café. This selection process was completed in April and the Chapter looks forward to welcoming the new catering partner in Summer/Autumn of 2022.

Looking forward, CCEL is a much lower-risk operation than before, focussed on accommodation, a volunteer-led shop within the Cathedral building and venue hire supported by two excellent third-party event caterers. Chapter continues to support CCEL, but after a stronger than expected year of trading CCEL was able to repay £150,000 of the formalised loan facility and as at the end of March 2022 the outstanding balance was down to £153,040. The Directors do not foresee a requirement for any further financial support, looking instead to significant surpluses that support the Cathedral in its mission.

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited - Overall result for the year end March 2022

Overall CCEL made a profit of £129,360 for the year to 31 March 2022 which compares to a loss of £134,641 in the previous year. This positive swing of over £260,000 is the direct outcome of the restructuring of CCEL's activities.

Covid-19 Statement

The financial year ending 31 March 2022 for Chapter, and its wholly owned trading subsidiary Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd (CCEL), continued to be affected by Covid-19, as a result of rolling lockdowns and other national restrictions. Operational closures, both temporary and permanent, bought organisational disruption and created significant financial deficits which were only mitigated by the support of government schemes and other grant giving bodies. Without this major external COVID support amounting to £389,203 and the continued support of its regular donors, the Cathedral would have been facing a significant financial deficit. However, the withdrawal of this support presents new challenges for our next financial year.

THE CATHEDRAL'S PLANS FOR 2022/23

Vision and Strategy

The Chapter has taken inspiration from the 'Four Pillars' of Dominican life: Prayer, Study, Community and Mission and the way in which each of these 'pillars' support and interrogate one another, thus challenging us at an institutional level. What has followed is a consideration of various aspects of the Cathedral's life bringing the four pillars into view. For example, when contemplating our work for social justice, we might ask how it is rooted in prayer, informed by biblical and theological reflection and how it is engaging the Cathedral community. Similarly, the pillars ask of each one of us: How is my prayer life? How am I growing in knowledge of God, the world and myself? What do I offer up to the Christian community? How am I serving God in the world?

The seven areas of Cathedral life that form the foundation of the Cathedral's strategy are:

- 1. Worship
- Teaching, Learning and Engagement
- Fellowship and Hospitality
- Culture and Governance
- Outreach and Evangelism
- 6. Heritage, Fabric and Environment
- Funding, Finance and Enterprise

The Chapter has sought feedback on its vision and strategy, including from volunteers, the congregation, the Bishop, and the Community Roll annual general meeting held on 10th May 2022. Its next step will be an implementation plan.

Charities Commission registration

Under the Cathedral Measures Act 2021, the Cathedral is scheduled to be registered with the Charities Commission in 2023.

As part of the implementation of the 2021 Cathedral Measures, the Cathedral Council will cease to exist. In the forthcoming year Chapter would like to pilot a new Advisory Committee. This committee would not be part of the Cathedral's governance structure but instead will provide a forum of representatives from the diocese, city, congregations, volunteers, partners and staff, offering ideas as well as advice.

Visitor's Desk

Spring 2022 saw the introduction of a new Visitors' Desk within the Cathedral's West Porch. This Desk is manned by a small, newly recruited staff team, complementing the already high-quality welcome provided by our volunteers. The Desk is part of a trial, a similar approach is commonplace at Cathedrals, historic sites, and visitor attractions. Upon entry, visitors will be invited to make a donation, supporting the life and work of the Cathedral, before being warmly welcomed by our volunteer team. We believe that a visit to the Cathedral is a special experience, and a valuable one for visitors. The Cathedral they experience today is not a historic monument but a living, worshipping church that we are committed to sustaining into the future.

Worship and Music

As part of our diversity programme, for the start of the next academic year in September 2022, girls as well as boys will be able to audition for places in the Cathedral Choir, together with opportunities for female lay vicars.

Major Projects

The final project phase for the roof, the Nave, spanning the largest part of the Cathedral, was scheduled to commence in July 2020. The decision to delay the final phase of the roof project afforded Cathedral Chapter and Chichester Cathedral Restoration & Development Trust (the Trust) time to review finances in light of the impact of the pandemic. During this period, the Cathedral's income from visitor donations, events, rental income from commercial properties and accommodation, and investment income were heavily impacted. The Trust diverted its energies from completing the roof appeal to secure emergency grants, successfully raising over £1million to sustain jobs and services. After a delay of two years the final phase of the roof project is scheduled to commence in July 2022. Once complete the award-winning lead roofs are expected to protect our Cathedral for the next 200 years.

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited

We look forward to welcoming Seasoned as our new café partner in late summer 2022. The Cloisters Café and Gardens will be replacing the much-missed former café which closed as a result of the pandemic.

In the Autumn, our new holiday accommodation at 1 St Faiths will be ready to accept guests, completing our suite of holiday let properties.

Chichester Cathedral Restoration and Development Trust

The American Patrons is a growing scheme allowing Americans to explore and celebrate the historical links between America and Sussex, whilst making a tax efficient contribution to the life of the Cathedral.

This year we will be launching a very special five-day Sussex Tour for Americans living both in the UK and overseas as part of our American Patron scheme. The tour will include visits and special access to some of the great historic houses and gardens in Sussex. Chichester Cathedral was a guest exhibitor at the online National Conference of Endowed Episcopalian Parishes in America earlier this year. Delegates were able to take part in our virtual pilgrimage to the shrine of St Richard, join our Cathedral for choral evensong and explore some of the historical links between America and Sussex.

REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS TO THE CHAPTER OF CHICHESTER CATHEDRAL

We have audited the financial statements of the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral ("the Chapter") for the year ended 31 March 2022 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, the Consolidated and Chapter only balance sheets, the Consolidated Cashflow statement and the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) including FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland".

This report is made solely to the Cathedral Chapter, as a body, in accordance with the regulations made under Section 27 of the Cathedrals Measure 1999. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the Chapter those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Cathedral Chapter as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

In our opinion the financial statements;

- give a true and fair view of the state of the group's and of the Chapter's affairs as at 31 March 2022, of its incoming resources and application of resources for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals, as specified by the Church Commissioners under section 27 of the Cathedral Measures 1999.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the group in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of the members of Chapter for the financial statements

The members of the Chapter are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as they determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the members of Chapter are responsible for assessing the group's and the Cathedral's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless they intend to liquidate the group or the Cathedral or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

The members of Chapter are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Annual Report of the Chapter. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF PREPARATION

The Cathedral constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulations for English Anglican Cathedrals issued in December 2018 by the Cathedral Administration and Finance Association, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

GOING CONCERN

Chapter consider that there is a reasonable expectation that the Cathedral has and will continue to have adequate resources to operate for the foreseeable future.

The Covid-19 pandemic has had a material impact on the Cathedral both in terms of its ability to operate and the level of income generated from all sources. Action taken to mitigate the impact of the pandemic is detailed in the Covid-19 statement on page 18 of the annual report.

Given the actions taken and the production of forecasts that show adequate resources are available to contend with any further prolonged lockdown the accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of the Chapter and of its wholly owned subsidiary company Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited.

INCOME

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the Cathedral is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations, legacies and grants to be recognised the Cathedral will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the income and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained, then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the Cathedral and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

THE CATHEDRAL, ITS ANCILLARY BUILDINGS AND THE INVENTORY

In accordance with the Guidelines on English Anglican Cathedral Accounts, no value is attributed in the balance sheet to the Cathedral and its ancillary buildings as it is an inalienable and historic building for which no reliable cost information or conventional valuation basis is available.

No value is attributed to items included in the Cathedral inventory which comprises items of architectural, archaeological, artistic or historic interest.

ANNUAL REPORT AND AUDITED ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH 2022

ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

EQUIPMENT AND PLANT

Chapter:-

In accordance with the Accounting and Reporting Regulation for English Anglican Cathedrals plant, machinery, office equipment, furniture and fittings and computer equipment are written off on acquisition.

Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Limited:-

Assets with an initial cost price which exceeds £500 are capitalised and depreciation is provided to write down the cost of all tangible fixed assets by equal annual instalments over their expected useful economic lives. The rates generally applicable are:-

Furniture and equipment

10% and 20% on cost

Fittings in premises

10% on cost

Computer equipment

25% on cost

INVESTMENT PROPERTY

Investment properties are initially measured at cost and subsequently are included at fair value of the freehold and lease investments.

The non-investment properties are included at a nominal value.

LISTED INVESTMENTS

Investments are included in the financial statements as follows:

- (a) Investments are shown at their fair value on 31st March 2022.
- (b) Realised gains and losses are calculated as the difference between their market value on the date of disposal and their market value on the previous balance sheet date.

STOCKS

Shop and refectory stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

VALUE ADDED TAX

A group registration for the Chapter and Chichester Cathedral Enterprises Ltd is in operation. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of the items reported in the financial statements.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO PENSION SCHEMES

The pension costs charged to the accounts represent the amount of the contributions paid to both the Defined Benefit and Pension Builders Schemes in respect of the accounting period.

FUNDS

The financial statements include the following funds:-

- (a) Endowment funds those where there is no power to spend the capital
- (b) Restricted funds those where there are specific conditions attached to the expenditure of either capital or income or both
- (c) Unrestricted funds those where both capital and income may be spent at the discretion of the Chapter.

NatWest Mortgage Loan

A £350,000 loan was entered into by Chapter during the 2019 year in connection with the purchase of the remaining 42.2% of the freehold interest in 49 West Street, Chichester. The loan is due to be repaid in equal monthly instalments over 20 years at an interest rate of 2.45% over base rate per annum and is secured on the property.

Volunteers

Over 450 volunteers offer time and talents to the Cathedral in numerous capacities in varying degrees.

15 Pensions

Clergy pensions are the liability of the Church Commissioners who pay contributions to the Church of England Funded Pensions Scheme.

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral participates in the Church of England Defined Benefits Scheme (DBS), part of the Church Workers Pensions Fund, for employees who joined the staff before 31st December 2002 and the Church of England Contribution Scheme (DCS). At 31st March 2019 the Chapter had no active members and 9 deferred pension members in the fund. The assets of the fund are held separately from those of the Chapter of Chichester Cathedral.

The Defined Benefits scheme was the subject of a full actuarial valuation as at 31 December 2019. The fund as it related to the Chapter was shown to be in deficit. The total deficit was assessed to be £135,900. Chapter has entered into a revised payment arrangement to eliminate the deficit arising. Annual payments of £19,000 will be made to 31 March 2021 at which point they will increase to £19,465 per annum until 1 April 2028.

Full provision has been made in these financial statements for the deficit as noted above.

In addition contribution rates have increased from 1 April 2015 to a total of 37.9% (employers 24.7% and employees 13.2%).

The Chapter of Chichester Cathedral also participates in a stakeholder defined contribution scheme. Contributions to this scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they arise.

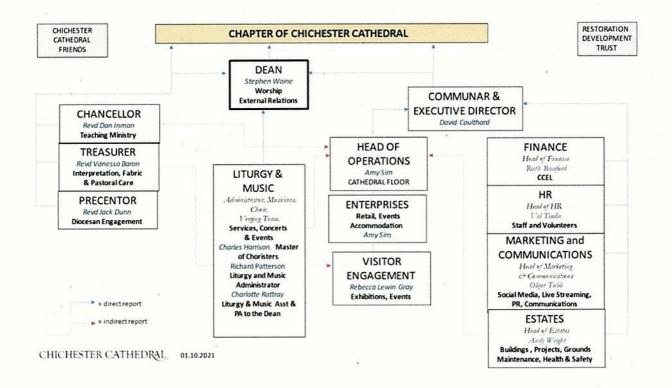
