Almighty God,

in the unity of the Holy Spirit,

## **FIRST READING** Isaiah 49: 1-7

Listen to me, O coastlands, pay attention, you peoples  
from far away! The Lord called me before I was born,  
while I was in my mother's womb he named me. He made  
my mouth like a sharp sword, in the shadow of his hand he  
hid me; he made me a polished arrow, in his quiver he hid  
me away. And he said to me, 'You are my servant, Israel, in  
whom I will be glorified.' But I said, 'I have laboured in vain,  
I have spent my strength for nothing and vanity; yet surely  
my cause is with the Lord, and my reward with my God.'  
And now the Lord says, who formed me in the womb to be  
his servant, to bring Jacob back to him, and that Israel  
might be gathered to him, for I am honoured in the sight of  
the Lord, and my God has become my strength – he says,  
'It is too light a thing that you should be my servant to raise  
up the tribes of Jacob and to restore the survivors of Israel;  
I will give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation  
may reach to the end of the earth.' Thus says the Lord,  
the Redeemer of Israel and his Holy One, to one deeply  
despised, abhorred by the nations, the slave of rulers,  
'Kings shall see and stand up, princes, and they shall  
prostrate themselves, because of the Lord, who is faithful,  
the Holy One of Israel, who has chosen you.'

## **PSALM 40: 1-12**

I waited patiently for the Lord : and he inclined unto me,  
and heard my calling.

He brought me also out of the horrible pit, out of the mire  
and clay : and set my feet upon the rock, and ordered my  
goings.

And he hath put a new song in my mouth : even a  
thanksgiving unto our God.

Many shall see it, and fear : and shall put their trust in the

I have not hid thy righteousness within my heart : my talk hath been of thy truth and of thy salvation.

**SECOND READING** 1 Corinthians 1: 1-9

From Paul, called to be an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and our brother Sosthenes, To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, together with all those who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.  
I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind – just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you – so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

**GOSPEL ACCLAMATION**

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

**GOSPEL READING** John 1: 29-42

John the Baptist saw Jesus coming towards him and declared, 'Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, "After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me." I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel.' And John testified, 'I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit." And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God.'  
The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, 'Look, here is the Lamb of God!' The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi' (which translated means Teacher), 'where are you staying?' He said to them, 'Come and see.' They came and saw where he was

staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas' (which is translated Peter).

**From the Chichester District Foodbank team:** In 2025, you generously donated 768.2 kg of provisions - that's around 1,920 meals! Your generosity frees up resources that let us provide extra help, like practical guidance and a caring, listening ear when it's needed most. Every donation makes a real difference, and yours is truly appreciated. Last year, we were able to provide emergency food parcels to over 6,000 people, with 38% of them being children. **Weaving workshops** To celebrate the opening of *Glowing + Alive*, our new exhibition, Creative Learning is running two children's weaving workshops on Saturday 14 February 2026. These hands-on sessions invite children to explore textiles, colour, and storytelling in a fun and creative way. Each workshop will begin at the Piper tapestry, where children will learn about the artwork and draw inspiration from its imagery, textures, and colours. They will then move to the South Transept to create their own hand-woven bookmark.

## Match Funding for Music: an exciting milestone

We are delighted to share the latest news from our Match Funding for Music campaign, as at the end of December 2025. Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, **£911,000 has now been raised towards our £950,000 target**. This is a significant achievement and a strong endorsement of the place music has at the heart of the Cathedral's life. Thank you to everyone who has contributed so far.

Launched during our 950th anniversary year, the appeal continues until the end of March 2026, or until the full match funding target is reached. Every donation up to £950,000 continues to be matched pound for pound by four anonymous donors, doubling its impact.

The recent months have shown just how central music is to our worship. Between Advent and Epiphany, thousands gathered for services sung by the Cathedral Choir, supported by choristers, lay vicars, organists, staff and volunteers who contribute so much behind the scenes.

As we enter the final months of the appeal, we are seeking to raise the remaining £39,000 needed to reach the match funding target. Donations above £950,000 are, of course, still welcomed and will support the Music Endowment Fund, though they will no longer be matched. Completing the match funding will move us significantly closer to **our wider £5 million endowment goal, currently at £4.8 million**, helping to secure the future of choral worship, the training of young musicians and the commissioning of new music.

Any contribution, large or small, is welcomed, particularly while gifts are still being matched, and helps to ensure this living musical tradition continues to flourish for generations to come.
